GAVIN Home's Heirs against The Laird of Blacader.

The Laird of Blacader having wedlet the lands of Johnseleugh to Gavin Home, under reversion of 2500 merks, and such sums as should be bestowed on building of houses, for ease and safety of the tenants, and their goods; with 15 years tack after the loofing, for Lazo yearly: At the redemption, Gavin Home's Heirs craved 6000 merks for the expences of a house built by his father; which; by report of visitors and craftimen appointed by the Lords, was declared to extend to 6000 merks. Blacader's visitors reported, that the byres built for safety of the tenants' goods, were only estimated to L. 140; and the rest of the buildings were not necessary nor conform to the reversion.—The Lords modified L. 1900 for the buildings.

LADY BUCHANAN against The LAIRD.

In an action, purfued by the Lady against her Husband, for modification of a yearly sum to her, for her aliment, during his remaining out of the country, founded upon a contract made by him in her favours, whereby he was obliged to pay such sums of money to her, as the performappointed in the countract should modify; which perform being most part dead, and the survivor not resident in the country, the Lady desired the Lords, as becoming in their places, to modify the same to her, her husband being still out of the country, and she wanting maintenance.— The Lords sufficient the action founded upon the said contract, albeit made betwist the husband and the wife, and found it became in their hands, as in arbitrio boni viri to do the same; seeing the contract, ought to be allowed, that the husband should suttain his wife, according to the proportion and competency of his means; and therefore modified to her yearly, during his absence, 2000 merks.

These friends were dead or absent. The Lords modified the amount, as in arbitrio boni viri.
