M'DUFF against M'DUFF.

ONE M'Duff being confirmed executrix to her brother John M'Duff, and pur-M'Duff, which umquhile fuing the executors of umquhile was nearest of kin to the faid John M'Duff, the pursuer's brother, and who died M'Duff was that person, who, being nearest minor, and which umquhile of kin, as faid is, ought to have been tutor to the pupil; to pay to her the fums and goods intromitted with by him, together with the profits thereof fince the time of his intromission: In which action it being controverted, if this defender, as executrix conveened to the defunct, or the defunct's felf, if he were living, could be conveened as subject in annualrent for the monies alleged intromitted with by him, feeing it was alleged he was never tutor, and fo not liable in annualrent. The Lords found, That the defunct being that person, who might have been tutor in law to the pupil, albeit he was not tutor, yet having intromitted with the pupil's means, and so as pro-tutor behaving himself, was liable in annualrent to this pursuer, for all years since his intromission, for nummi pupillorum non debent effe otion, and so the Lords repelled the allegeance, and decerned for the annualrent.

Hume against Hume.

No 51. The relict and heir of a factor found not liable to pay the annualient of

ELIZABETH HUME, relict of umquhile Robert Hume of Corfrig, who, and her hufband for his interest, had obtained decreet against one Hume, her father's brother, for payment of certain goods and gear, pertaining to her by her father's testament, wherein this Hume, who was decerned executor nominate and con-

firmed, and who had also accepted a factory from the said Elizabeth's tutor, the said Hume being deceased, and also the pursuer's husband; she now pursues the relict of the said factor, as intromissariax and executrix to her husband, who before was decerned, and his heirs, to make payment of the annualrents and profits of the sums decerned, of all years and terms continually since the said factor's intromission, and in time to come, while the payment be made:——Wherein the Lords sound, That neither the relict of the said sactor, nor his heirs, were subject in law to pay the said profit, the sums being intromitted with by the said factor, by the space of thirty years since, or thereby, albeit decreet was recovered in anno 1620, or thereby, against the sactor for the principal sums; but sound, That her action for the said profits was competent to her against her own tutor, and not against the heir or executor of the sactor.

*** By act of Sederunt, 31st July 1690, it is declared, That where there is a fequestration of rents, and a factor named by the Lords, that the factor shall be liable for annualrent of what rents he shall recover, or by diligence might have recovered, within a year after the same are due, in respect the factor cannot safely pay to any of the competitors until the preference be concluded; and in like manner, that no aliment shall be granted to debtors or persons having right to a reversion or to the property after the distresses are purged, unless it be evident that there is a superplus rent over and above all the annualrents of the person's competing.

CREDITORS of CARDEN against Robertson.

In a process at the instance of creditors on a bankrupt estate, against the factor, wherein they craved, That he might be liable for annualrent, within a year after the rents fell due, in the terms of the act of sederunt, ult. July 1690.——The Lords found the factor liable in annualrent, conform to the said act, and so confirmed it by a decision; and this though the fortune was small; and the creditors usually applied for warrants upon the factor for their annualrents, which he could not quickly answer, unless he were allowed to keep money in his hands.
