E. ANNANDALE against E. NITHSDALE.

THE Earl of Annandale being infeft by the Earl of Nithfdale in an annualrent out of the lands of Glendinning, raifes, upon his fafine, arreftment; and arrefts in the hands of the tenants, the mails and duties addebted by them for the faids lands, and thereupon purfues the tenants to make the fame forthcoming to him, for fatisfying the faid annualrent. And the tenants *alleging*, That fuch an action is a great novelty upon a fafine of an annualrent, to convene the tenants perfonally to pay the mails, and to arreft the fame, there never being any preceding fentence, neither againft the ground to poind the fame, nor againft the heritor, nor no other purfuit, but this upon a naked arreftment, raifed upon a fafine, and againft a third perfon who cannot be fo convened, but are purchafed *periculo impetrantis*, no party being heard nor cited thereto: Which allegeance was repelled, and the action fuftained.

GUTHRIE against E. GALLOWAY.

RICHARD GUTHRIE being made affignee, by Doctor Lindfay and Chriftian Heriot his fpoule, to the bygones of an annualrent of 300 merks yearly, wherein they were infeft by John Achanay of Sorbie, and for which they had obtained fentence, to poind the ground of the lands of Sorbie, which were affected with the faid annualrent, purfues the Earl of Galloway and his fons, as heritors of the faids lands, and as they who uplift the mails and duties of the faids lands from the tenants, occupiers thereof, to make payment to him of the faid annualrent, for certain years bygone owing to them; during the which years the faids defenders were in poffeifion of the duties, as faid is; wherein the defenders *alleging*, That this action ought not to be fuftained for a perfonal purfuit againft the defenders, who are not authors of the purfuer's right of the annualrent libelled, nor heirs, nor apparent heirs to him; but the moft the purfuer can obtain by the cuftom and practice of the country, is only action and execution againft the ground, and againft the tenants poffeifors thereof, for poinding of the ground,

WILSON against RUSSELL.

WILSON being infeft in an annualrent in the lands of , and having obtained a decreet of poinding the ground; thereafter, Ruffell, being a creditor, did arreft the mails and duties in the tenant's hands, which were due to the mafter; and purfuing to make arrefted goods forthcoming, the tenant being removed off the ground with his whole goods : It was alleged for Wilfon, That he ought to be preferred, becaufe his decreet of poinding of the ground was before the arrestment, and being a real diligence, did affect the whole duties payable to the mafter .-- It was answered for Ruffell, That the tenant being removed with the whole goods, fuch decreets and letters being only to poind the ground, and the goods thereon, could not affect him nor his goods.----THE LORDS did prefer Wilfon, the annualrenter, and found he having done prior diligence, whereby he might have poinded the tenant before he removed, albeit he did prejudge himfelf of all the execution against the tenant's goods, after they were off the ground, yet quoad the duties payable to the mafter, for which he might purfue him perfonali actione, he was not prejudged from the benefit thereof by the tenant's removal: But the decreet of poinding of the ground, and letters thereof, being a real execution prior to the arreftment, made him preferable to the arrefter, as to the duties for which he was liable to the common debtor.
