#### CARNEGIE of Balmachie against DURHAM of Anachie.

NO II. The fame found.

THE LORDS found, That albeit by the common law, annualrent be due for tocher; yet, by our cuftom, it is not payable, unlefs it be fo provided by the bond or contract for the fame; but, in the cafe in queftion, they found the defender liable to pay annualrent, in refpect the debtor had been in use of payment, at the leaft, had promifed to pay annualrant for certain years bygone; and annualrent once payed, implies a tacit paction to continue the payment of the fame.

1628. December 2. ZAIR against RAMSAY.

NO 12. Annualrent flipulated for one term, found ever due till payment.

In a purfuit Zair contra Ramfay, for payment of the by-gone annualrents, of a fum contained in a bond, which was of this tenor, that the debtor was obliged to pay 1000 pounds at the term in the bond, and in cafe of failzie, to pay 100 pounds for annualrent and profit thereof, with 300 merks of expences, if the creditor fhould be compelled to feek and charge for the fame; this bond was found to be heritable, and the debtor was found fubject to pay the whole byrun annualrents, yearly fince the term of payment, albeit the bond bore only the debtor to be bound to pay one year's profit and a penalty, and not to pay yearly that annualrent, fo long as the fum was unpaid.

1669. January 13. EARL of WINTOUN against SEATOUN of Minnes.

GEORGE SEATON of Minnes, having borrowed from the Earl of Wintoun's grand-father, the fum of L. 400, and given ticket to one Heriot his fervant, payable at Lambmas 1650, and by a miffive letter at Martinmas thereafter, directed to the Earl, excufing himfelf for not payment at the term, and promifing to pay annualrent for the time that the Earl had lyen out : This Earl of Wintoun, as having right from the executors of Heriot, did purfue both for principal and the whole annualrents, extending to as much as the principal fum; which the LORDS did fuftain, notwithfanding it was *alleged*, That the miffive letter was only obligator for payment of annualrent the time preceding, but not for the future; and therefore, the defender was not *in mora*, having offered by the faid miffive to pay the fame to the Earl of Marfhall, if the Earl of Wintoun would fo order

it; for they found, That annualrent being once promifed, the debtor was ftill liable therefor, until payment; albeit the promife did bear no fuch thing. Fol. Dic. v. 1. p. 37. Gosford, MS. No 81. p. 29.

DAVID CARNAGIE of Balmachie against DURHAM of Omachie, and his TUTOR.

IN a pursuit at Balmachie's inflance, against Durham of Omachie, as reprefenting his grand-father, for payment of the fum of 3000 merks, as the remainder of the wife's tocher, contained in a contract of marriage; as likewife for the payment of fome nolt and fheep delivered to Omachie, or fome by his order.---It was *alleged* for the defender, That he ought to be affoilized for the annualrent of the fum due in the contract, becaufe it did bear no obligement to pay annualrent after the term of payment; and as to the annualrent of 1000 merks, it was not payable until after Omachie's decease, and so could not bear annualrent, his heirs nor executors not being bound.—It was alleged as to the price of nolt and fheep fold and delivered, that not being purfued within five years, conform to the late act of Parliament, it was not probable, but vel fcripto vel juramento.---It was replied to the first, That albeit the contract did not bear annualrent, yet the purfuer producing a fitted account, flated by Omachie himfelf, not only for the principal fum refting, but for the whole bygone annualrents, with a fubfcribed ticket to make payment of both at a certain day; it was a fufficient ground for annualrent thereafter; use and payment of bygones being fustained by our law, without any obligement in write; and for the thouland merks, payable after Omachie's decease, albeit none can be craved but fince his death, yet it being a part of that fame principal fum of 5000 merks of tocher, by flating himfelf debtor in annualrent for all that was due in his own time, it was a juft ground to make that fum bear annualrent fince the term of payment.-It was replied to the fecond, That the delivery and price of the goods libelled was probable, prout de jure, being before the late act of Parliament, which did only extend ad futura; whereas, before that act, bygones of that kind were only probable by witneffes within forty years.——THE LORDS did repell the first defence, and found the whole remaining fum of the tocher to bear annualrent, in refpect of the fitted account, and fubicribed ticket produced, which were far ftronger obligations than was naked use and custom; and likewise found, that the last 1000 merks, payable after Omachie's decease, should bear annualrent, as being a part of the total for which he had acknowledged annualrent to be due, as likeways becaufe it was a part of the tocher contracted ad fuftimenda onera matrimorii, for which the law allows annualrent ex mora. As to the fecond, the Lords did fuffain the purfuit probable prout de jure, the delivery being long before the late act of
