WARROCK against Brown.

IN a competition, Brown having arrefted, by an officer of the town of Edinburgh, by warrant of a bailie, but whofe execution bore no witneffes, which was alleged to be the cuftom of the place; and within few days after, Warrock having arrefted by a folem arreftment, the execution whereof had witneffes infert:

THE LORDS preferred the posterior arrester, his arrestment being the most folemn and formal, though posterior.

No 15. Letters of arreftment and furthcoming, were fent off to be executed together. Notwithftanding the incongruity, this was permitted for the fake of conveniency.

ONE having obtained a decreet against his debtor, he thereon raifes letters of arreftment, and likewife a fummons to make furthcoming, and fends them both to the country to be executed. When the action of furthcoming is called, it is alleged, No process; because it is raifed before the arrestment was laid on, and fo is filtus ante patrem, and a nimious prepofterous diligence; feeing by the order of nature the arreftment fhould precede, and when it is once executed, then the fummons of furthcoming may be raifed, and no fooner; and it flocks common fenfe and reafon, to raife a libel narrating an arreftment, which is not yet in rerum natura.—Answered, There is nothing more ordinary, being much to the eafe and accommodation of the lieges, and has no inconvenience following it. Suppofe the parties dwell in Orkney, what an expence and lofs of time would that be, first to fend the letters of arrestment to lay it on, and when that is returned back to Edinburgh, then to raife the fummons of furthcoming to be executed ; whereas it is a great advantage to the people to fend them both at one time, and first to give the copy of arreftment, and then the next day the execution of the procefs of furthcoming; even as the citations for the first and fecond diet are given at one time, and a charge to enter heir, and a fummons on the paffive titles founded on that charge may be given simul et semel.—Replied, This is a clear invertion of our ftyles and forms, and may be prejudicial to the lieges; for, put the cafe, that one follows the regular course of law in arrefting first, and then raifing his fummons to make furthcoming; another creditor, to prevent him, fends both his letters of arreftment and furthcoming together, and caufes execute them at one time; this pofterior arrefter will certainly get the first decreet of furthcoming. and crave preference to the other, though first in cursu diligentia; fo he who obferves form shall thereby lofe his cause; and the transgreffor, by his precipitation, fhall *lucrari*.—____THE LORDS confidered the practice had grown up to near a cuftom, and might endanger the quarrelling of many diligences if rejected; and that, in fuch cafes, error communis is allowed jus facere quoad præterita, per leg. 3.
