## ARRESTMENT.

## 1745. Fanuary II.

## NEILSON and RAE, and Others, Creditors of Robertsons, Competing.

JAMES ROBERTSON, by his testament, disponed his whole moveable effects to Robert his uncle, for the behoof of his the faid James's creditors in the first place, and the refidue for the behoof of his wife and children. Of which disposition Robert having accepted, certain perfons, to whom James and Robert were jointly and feverally bound, did, after the death of James, raife horning on their bonds against Robert, and thereupon arrested not only in the hands of the debtors of Robert, but also in the hands of the proper debtors of James .- And thereupon having purfued furthcomings, it was objected by the other creditors of James, who had confirmed executors-creditors to him, That the arreftments in the hands of the debtors of James were ineffectual, having no other warrant than what was in the ordinary file of a horning against Robert, viz. to arrest, &c. all goods pertaining to Robert, and of course the arrestments were only of Robert's effects. But. fo it is, that James's effects were not transferred to Robert for his own behoof, but only in truft; and therefore, without a process or decree against Robert astruftee, the arreftment of the effects of James was ineffectual.

This the LORDS ' repelled, and fuffained the arrestments.'

It was confidered, that even though fuch process had been purfued, and decree obtained against Robert, the form of the warrant and arrestment had both been the fame as for the debt of Robert. Wherefore, as James's effects were disponed to Robert, and that James was jointly bound with Robert in the debts, which were the ground of the diligence, it was thought not necessary for the creditors to have any other warrant.

ELIZABETH OLIPHAN'T against Archibald CAMPBELL.

WILLIAM SHIELLS being debtor to Elizabeth Oliphant, daughter of Mr James Oliphant of Langtoun, fhe arrefted in the hands of Mrs Forbes, a debtor of his, and purfued a furthcoming before the Sheriffs of Edinburgh; and Mrs Forbes called, in a multiplepoinding, Archibald Campbell brewer in Edinburgh, a pofterior arrefter; who objected, That the purfuer's arreftment proceeded on a warrant contained in the fummons of conflictution; whereas the party ought first to have been cited, and then a warrant fued out for arreftment: Whereupon the Sheriff preferred the purfuer; and the caufel being craved to be advocated, the LORD ORDINARY, 3d January, ' Remitted, with an infiruction to fustain the objection." No 8.

Arreftment fuftained, proceeding on the warrant in a fummons of conflitution fromthe Sheriff, although the party was not cited, previous to the arreftment.

## ARRESTMENTY

No 8.

*Pleaded* in a reclaiming bill: It is the conftant practice before the Sheriff courts, to grant warrant to cite, and thereupon to arreft; and it is not denied the citation was given before execution of the arreftment.

Answered: The warrant for arreftment on a dependence, ought to be iffued after the dependence is created by the citation; and fo the practice frequently is before the Sheriffs, and conftantly before the Court of Seffion.

THE LORDS remitted, with an inftruction to repel the objection.

\*\*\* Lord Kilkerran mentions the fame cafe thus :

MRS FORBES, in whole hands feveral arreftments were laid by the creditors of William Sheills, purfued a multiplepoinding before the Sheriff of Edinburgh, wherein fhe called the two arrefters, Elizabeth Oliphant and Archibald Campbell, and William Sheills the common debtor. In this process it was *objected* by Archibald Campbell to Elizabeth Oliphant's arreftment, That though prior in date, it was void, in respect it proceeded on a precept adjected to the will of the fummons of constitution against her debtor Sheills; whereas precepts for arreftment on a dependence, can only be granted after a citation returned, as thereby the dependence is created. 2do, He offered to improve the execution of the fummons on which her extracted decree of constitution against Sheills had proceeded; both which the Sheriff repelled.

And he having complained by a bill of advocation, the ORDINARX before whom it came, ' Remitted to the Sheriff to fulfain both objections.'

But the having reclaimed, the LORDS were of opinion with the Sheriff on both points. On the first, it being the common practice of inferior courts to iffue the precept of arreftment in the fummons for conflictution, different from what is the form in proceffes before the Lords. On the second, becaufe as Sheills had appeared in the proceeds of conflictution againft him, and acknowledged the debt, and for which decree proceeded againft him, it was not competent for Campbell, who neither was nor could be party in that proceeds, to object to the execution of the fummons on which the decree proceeded.

But a third objection being made in the answer to her petition, viz. That the arrestment was laid on eleven days before the fuminons of conflictation was executed; the Lords, for that reason, and that only, ' paffed the bill of advocation.'
