CHRICHTON against SYME.

Chrichton pursued Syme on a missive for relief of cautionry. Syme suspended, and pleaded that the missive was not holograph nor tested in terms of the Act 1681, and, not being in re mercatoria, was void and null. The Lords, 21st July 1772, found so; and that it could not be supported by referring the verity of the subscription to Syme's oath. The cause came before Lord Justice-Clerk, who took it to report on information. The Lords ordered additional memorials, and then decided. "They sustained the reasons of suspension, suspended the letters simpliciter, and decerned."

Had it been in re mercatoria, the missive would have been sustained, Clark

In a reduction of a discharge of a trifling legacy of £20 Scots, inter rusticos nearly connected, the Lord Auchinleck, Ordinary, by interlocutor, pronounced this judgment:—" Having considered the debate, the smallness of the sum, the relations of the parties to one another, and their rusticity, sustains the defence of the discharge produced, and assoilyies the defender, and decerns." But his Lordship altered, and "Having considered the positive enactment of the statute 1681, which does not appear from the practice of the Court to have been departed from in cases such as the present, finds the writing founded on by the defenders, as a discharge, is null." The Lords refused a petition, without answers, and adhered. The reduction was at the instance of a creditor of the legatee.

1762.

MARGARET BUCHAN against John Gouck.

A person having subscribed an assignation in this manner, viz. by filling up scores, drawn by a third party, the assignation found null. See Dict., Vol. II. p. 533, Pringle against Keill; Falconer, 28th November 1750, Crosbie and Pickens against Pickens. The interlocutor, Buchan against Gouck, was "on report of the Lord A. The Lords find the reasons of reduction of the assignation quarrelled, as not being properly subscribed by Christian Buchan, relevant and proven, and therefore reduce the same and decern." Decided anno 1762. Informations dated January 1762.
