Deeds of fettlement containing a nomination of executors, having been reduced by the Court of Seflion, the neareft in kin may get themlelves confirmed during the dependence of an appeal againt the decree of reduction, to the effect of vefting a title in themfelves from the date of the confirmation, in cafe the judgment hould ve affirmed.

George Ross and Others applied to the Commiffary of Dumfries to be decerned executors-dative, qua neareft in kin, to the late Richard Lowthian.

Sarah Aglianby, Mr Lowthian's widow, ftated objections to the edict, founded on certain deeds, in which the was named his executor. Thefe deeds, fle adnitted, had been reduced by the Court of Seflion; but fhe contended, that, as fhe had entered an appeal againft their judgment, no perfon ought to be confirmed during its dependence.

The Commiffary accordingly 'delayed giving any decifion in the edict till difcumfing of faid appeal.'

The Lord Ordinary refufed a bill of advocation complaining of this judgment.
The neareft in kin prefented a reclaiming petition, ftating, that as one of their number was 76 years of age, and in a valetudinary ftate of health, there was much reafon to apprehend, that any delay of the confirmation might have the effes of altering the courfe of fucceffion. And that, although the fervice of the writ of appeal mult no doubt ftop the execution of the decree of reduction, yet it could not reftore the deeds reduced, which were in boc ftatu to be confidered as nonentities, and therefore they could not operate as a bar to the confirmation. 19th July 1710, Lyon and affignee againft Lady Kinnaird, No 2. p. $5^{80}$. ; Wallace, 2d July 1774 , Heron againft Heron, voce Inhibition.

Observed on the Bench: The petitioners ought to be allowed to proceed in completing their titles, to the effect of vefting the right, and enabling them to tranfmit it to their own neareft in kin, if they fhould happen to die in the mean time.

The Court granted the prayer of the petition, for the purpofe of vefting a title, upon the petitioners agreeing not to intromit till the appeal fhould be difcuffed.
