# The National Bus Travel Concession Scheme for Older and Disabled Persons (Scotland) Amendment Order 2013

 1st April 2013

The Scottish Ministers make the following Order in exercise of the powers conferred by sections 40(1), (3) and (4) and 52(4) of the Transport (Scotland) Act 2005(a) and all other powers enabling them to do so.

In accordance with section 52(3) of that Act, a draft of this Order has been laid before, and approved by resolution of, the Scottish Parliament.

#### Citation and commencement

**1.** This Order may be cited as the National Bus Travel Concession Scheme for Older and Disabled Persons (Scotland) Amendment Order 2013 and comes into force on 1st April 2013.

# Amendments to the National Bus Travel Concession Scheme for Older and Disabled Persons (Scotland) Order 2006

- **2.**—(1) The National Bus Travel Concession Scheme for Older and Disabled Persons (Scotland) Order 2006(**b**) is amended as follows.
  - (2) At the end of article 12(2B)(b) (capped level of funding) omit "and".
  - (3) At the end of article 12(2B)(c) insert—

- (d) for the financial year beginning on 1st April 2013 £187,000,000; and
- (e) for the financial year beginning on 1st April 2014 £192,000,000".
- (4) After article 12(2C) (reimbursement rate) insert—
  - "(2D) The reimbursement rate is—
    - (a) 60% for the financial year beginning on 1st April 2013; and
