## **Employment Tribunals Rules of Procedure 2013 - Rule 21**

- 1. The correct title of the respondent is Davida (U.K.) Ltd (in creditors voluntary liquidation) and the title of the proceedings is ordered to be amended accordingly.
- 2. Mr Peter Dillon was unfairly dismissed by the respondent by reason of redundancy. The respondent is ordered to pay him a compensatory award in the total sum of £1,144.72 (being 2 weeks net wages @ £303.36 net per week and loss of statutory rights @ £538.00).
- 3. The Recoupment Regulations do not apply to this award.

### THE EMPLOYMENT TRIBUNALS (INTEREST) ORDER 1990

Tribunal case number: 2409036/2020

The Employment Tribunals (Interest) Order 1990 provides that sums of money payable as a result of a judgment of an Employment Tribunal (excluding discrimination or equal pay awards or sums representing costs or expenses), shall carry interest where the sum remains unpaid on a day ("the calculation day") 42 days after the day ("the relevant judgment day") that the document containing the tribunal's judgment is recorded as having been sent to the parties.

The rate of interest payable is that specified in section 17 of the Judgments Act 1838 on the relevant judgment day. This is known as "the stipulated rate of interest" and the rate applicable in your case is set out below.

The following information in respect of this case is provided by the Secretary of the Tribunals in accordance with the requirements of Article 12 of the Order:-
