



CAP. I.

An Act to provide for the Authentication of certain Orders of the Privy Council in the Absence of the Clerk of the Council in Ordinary.

[21st July 1859.]

HEREAS certain Orders of Her Majesty's Privy Council are by the Acts of Parliament which provide for the Issue thereof required to be certified or authenticated under the Hand of the Clerk in Ordinary of the said Council, and Delay and Inconvenience may arise in the event of such Clerk in Ordinary being prevented by Illness or otherwise from the Discharge of his Duty: Be it enacted by the Queen's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the Authority of the same, as follows:

I. Whenever Her Majesty shall, with the Advice of Her Privy Person au-Council, make Provision for the Performance of the Duties of the thorized by Her Majesty Clerk of the said Council in Ordinary in the event of his Absence, in Council any Person acting under the Authority of the Order in Council in to act in the this Behalf shall, in relation as well to the signing, certifying, and the Clerk of issuing of Orders of Her Majesty in Council, or of the Lords and the Council others of Her Majesty's Privy Council, under any Acts of Parliament may sign
