

## CHAPTER 51.

An Act for amending the Law relating to the Salaries of A.D. 1872. [6th August 1872.] Judges.

TATHEREAS it is expedient to amend the law relating to the salaries of judges, and in particular to provide that the salary of every judge in the United Kingdom is to begin from the date of his appointment as a judge and not (as is in some instances the case) from the death or resignation of his immediate predecessors:

Be it enacted by the Queen's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

- 1. This Act may be cited for all purposes as "The Judges Short title. Salaries Act, 1872."
- 2. Notwithstanding anything contained in any Act of Parlia- Commencement, the judicial salary of every judge in the United Kingdom ment and shall begin from the date of his appointment as judge, and not judicial before, and shall accrue due from day to day during the time of salaries. his continuance in office, and shall be payable at such intervals not exceeding three months as may be from time to time determined by the Treasury.

3. This Act in so far as relates to the accruer and payment Application of salaries shall apply to existing as well as to future judges.

4. The expression "judge" shall include every judge of Her Definition of Majesty's Superior Courts of Common Law or Equity in England and Ireland, every judge of the Court of Session in Scotland, and every assistant judge, county court judge, stipendiary magistrate, or other person performing judicial duties in the United Kingdom in respect of which he is paid a salary.
