# **INCOME TAX**

# The Double Taxation Relief (Taxes On Income) (Brunei)Order, 1950

*Made - - - 8th December 1950* 

At the Court at Buckingham Palace, the 8th dayof December, 1950

Present.

The King's Most Excellent Majesty in Council

Whereas it is provided by subsection (1) of section fifty-one of the Finance (No. 2) Act, 1945, that if His Majestyby Order in Council declares that arrangements specified in the Order havebeen made with the Government of any territory outside the United Kingdomwith a view to affording relief from double taxation in relation to incometax or profits tax and any taxes of a similar character imposed by the lawsof that territory, and that it is expedient that those arrangements shouldhave effect, the arrangements shall have effect to the extent specified inthat subsection: And Whereas under certain other provisions of Part V of the said Act certain other consequencesensue on the making of any such Order:

And Whereas a draft of this Order was laid before the CommonsHouse of Parliament in accordance with the provisions of subsection (2) of section fifty-six of thesaid Act and an Address has been presented to His Majesty by that House prayingthat an Order may be made into the terms of this Order:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, in exercise of the powers conferred Him by subsection (1) of the said section fifty-one and of all other powersenabling Him in that behalf, is pleased, by and with the advice of His PrivyCouncil, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

- 1. This Order may be cited as the Double Taxation Relief (Taxes on Income) (Brunei) Order, 1950.
- 2. It is hereby declared—
  - (a) that the arrangements specified in the Arrangement set out in the Scheduleto this Order have been made with the Government of Brunei with a view to affording relief from double taxation in relation to income tax or profitstax and taxes of a similar character imposed by the laws of Brunei; and
  - (b) that it is expedient that those arrangements should have effect.

#### **SCHEDULE**

ARRANGEMENT BETWEEN HIS MAJESTY'S GOVERNMENT AND THE GOVERNMENT OF BRUNEIFOR THE AVOIDANCE OF DOUBLE TAXATION AND THE PREVENTION OF FISCAL EVASIONWITH RESPECT TO TAXES ON INCOME

- 1.—(1) The taxes which are the subject of this Arrangement are—
  - (a) In the United Kingdom:

The income tax (including surtax) and theprofits tax (hereinafter referred to as "UnitedKingdom tax").

(b) In Brunei:

The income tax (hereinafter referred to as "Brunei tax").

- (2) This Arrangement shall also apply to any other taxes of a substantially similar character imposed in other UnitedKingdom or Brunei after this Arrangement has come into force.
  - 2.—(1) In this Arrangement, unless the contextotherwise requires—
    - (a) The term "UnitedKingdom" means Great Britain andNorthern Ireland, excluding the Channel Islands and the Isle of Man.
    - (b) The term "Brunei" means the State of Brunei.
    - (c) The terms "one of the territories" and "the other territory" mean the United Kingdom or Brunei, as the context requires.
    - (d) The term "tax" means United Kingdom tax or Brunei tax, as the context requires.
    - (e) The term "person" includes any body of persons, corporateor not corporate.
    - (f) The term "company" includes any body corporate.
    - (g) The terms "resident of the United Kingdom" and "resident of Brunei" mean respectively any person who is resident in the United Kingdom forthe purposes of United Kingdom tax and not resident in Brunei for the purposes of Brunei tax and any person who is resident in Brunei for the purposes of Brunei tax and not resident in the United Kingdom for the purposes of UnitedKingdom tax; and a company shall be regarded as resident in theUnited Kingdom for its business is managed and controlled in the United Kingdomand as resident in Brunei if its business is managed and controlled in Brunei.
    - (h) The terms "resident of one of the Territories" and "resident of the other territory" mean a person who is a resident of the United Kingdomor a person. who is a resident of Brunei, as the context requires.
    - (i) The terms "United Kingdom enterprise" and "Brunei enterprise" mean respectively an industrial or commercial enterprise or undertaking carriedon by a resident of the United Kingdom and an industrial or commercial enterprise of undertaking carried on by a resident of Brunei; and the terms "enterprise of one of the territories" and "enterprise of the other territory" mean a United Kingdom enterprise ora Brunei enterprise, as the context requires.
    - (j) The term "industrialor commercial profits" includes rentals in respect of cinematograph films.
    - (k) The term "permanentestablishment" when used with respect to an enterprise of one of the territories, means a branch, managementor other fixed place of business, but does not include an agency unless theagent has, and habitually exercises, a general authority to negotiate and conclude contracts on behalf of such enterprise or has a stock of merchandise from which he regularly fills orders on its behalf.

An enterprise of one of the territories shall not be deemed tohave a permanent establishment in the other territory merely because it carrieson business dealings in that other territory through a bona fidebroker or general commission agent acting in the ordinary course of his businessas such.

The fact that an enterprise of one of the territories maintains in the other territory a fixed place of business exclusively for the purchase of goods or merchandise shall not of itself constitute that fixed place of business a permanent establishment of the enterprise.

The fact that a company which is a resident of one of the territorieshas a subsidiary company which is a resident of the other territory or which engaged in trade or business in that other territory (whether through apermanent establishment or otherwise) shall not of itself constitute that subsidiary company a permanent establishment of its parent company.

- (2) Where under this Arrangement any income is exempt from tax in one of the territories if (with or without other conditions) it is subject to tax in the other territory, and that income is subject totax in that other territory by reference to the amount thereof which is remitted to or received in that other territory, the exemption to be allowed underthis Arrangement in the first-mentioned territory shall apply only to the amount so remitted or received.
- (3) In the application of the provisions of this Arrangement by the United Kingdom or Brunei, any term not otherwise defined shall, unless the context otherwise requires, have the meaning whichit has under the laws of the United Kingdom, or, as the case may be, Brunei, relating to the taxes which are the subject of this Arrangement.
- **3.**—(1) The industrial or commercial profitsof a United Kingdom enterprise shall not be subject to Brunei tax unless theenterprise is engaged in trade or business in Brunei through a permanent establishmentsituated therein. If it is so engaged, tax may be imposed on those profitsby Brunei but only on so much of them as is attributable to that permanentestablishment.
- (2) The industrial or commercial profits of a Brunei enterprise shall not be subject to United Kingdom tax unless theenterprise is engaged in trade or business in the United Kingdom through apermanent establishment situated therein. If it is so engaged, tax may be imposed on those profits by the United Kingdom, but only on so much of themas is attributable to that permanent establishment.
- (3) Where an enterprise of one of the territoriesis engaged in trade or business in the other territory through a permanentestablishment situated therein, there shall be attributed to that permanentestablishment the industrial or commercial profits which it might be expected to derive from its activities in that other territory if it were an independent enterprise engaged in the same or similar activities under the same or similar conditions and dealing at arm's length with the enterprise of which it is a permanent establishment.
- (4) No portion of any profits arising from the sale of goods or merchandise by an enterprise of one of the territories shall be attributed to a permanent establishment situated in the other territory by reason of the mere purchase of the goods or merchandise within that other territory.

#### 4. Where—

- (a) an enterprise of one of the territoriesparticipates directly or indirectly in the management, control or capital of an enterprise of the other territory, or
- (b) the same persons participate directly or indirectly in the management, control or capital of an enterprise of one of the territories and an enterprise of the other territory, and
- (c) in either case conditions are made orimposed between the two enterprises, in their commercial or financial relations, which differ from those which would be made between independent enterprises, then any profits which would but for those conditions have accrued to one of the enterprises but by reason of those conditions have not so accrued maybe included in the profits of that enterprise and taxed accordingly.

- **5.** Notwithstanding the provisions of paragraphs 3 and 4, profits which a resident of one of the territories derives from operating ships or aircraftshall be exempt from tax in the other territory.
- **6.**—(1) Dividends paid by a company residentin one of the territories to a resident of the other territory who is subject to tax in that other territory in respect thereof and not engaged in tradeor business in the first-mentioned territory through a permanent establishmentsituated therein, shall be exempt from any tax in that first-mentioned territorywhich is chargeable in dividends in addition to the tax chargeable in respectof the profits or income of the company.
- (2) Where a company which is a resident ofone of the territories derives profits or income from sources within the other territory, the Government of that other territory shall not impose any formof taxation on dividends paid by the company to persons not resident in that other territory, or any tax in the nature of an undistributed profits taxon undistributed profits of the company, by reasons of the fact that those dividends or undistributed profits represent, in whole or in part, profitsor income so derived.
- 7.—(1) Any royalty derived from sources withinone of the territories by a resident of the other territory who is subject to tax in that other territory in respect thereof and is not engaged in tradeor business in the first-mentioned territory through a permanent establishmentsituated therein, shall be exempt from tax in that first-mentioned territory; but no exemption shall be allowed under this paragraph in respect of so muchof any royalty as exceeds an amount which represents a fair and reasonable consideration for the rights for which the royalty is paid.
- (2) In this paragraph the term "royalty" means any royalty or other amount paid as consideration for the use of, or for the privilege of using, any copyright, patent, design, secret process or formula,trade-mark, or other like property, but does not include a royalty or otheramount paid in respect of the operation of a mine or quarry or of other extraction of natural resources.
- **8.**—(1) Remuneration, including pensions, paidby the Government of one of the territories to any individual for services rendered to that Government in the discharge of governmental functions shallbe exempt from tax in the other territory if the individual is not ordinarily resident in that other territory or (where the remuneration is not a pension) is ordinarily resident in that other territory solely for the purposes of rendering those services.
- (2) The provisions of this paragraph shallnot apply to payments in respect of services rendered in connection with anytrade or business carried on by either of the Governments for purposes ofprofit.
- **9.**—(1) An individual who is a resident of the United Kingdom shall be exempt from Brunei tax on profits or remuneration respect of personal (including professional) services performed within Brunei in any year of assessment if—
  - (a) he is present within Brunei for a periodor periods not exceeding in the aggregate 183 days during that year, and
  - (b) the services are performed for or onbehalf of a person resident in the United Kingdom, and
  - (c) the profits or remuneration are subject to United Kingdom tax.
- (2) An individual who is a resident of Bruneishall be exempt from United Kingdom tax on profits or remuneration in respectof personal (including professional) services performed within the UnitedKingdom in any year of assessment if—
  - (a) he is present within the United Kingdomfor a period or periods not exceeding in the aggregate 183 days during that year, and
  - (b) the services are performed for or onbehalf of a person resident in Brunei, and
  - (c) the profits or remuneration are subject to Brunei tax.

- (3) The provisions of this paragraph shallnot apply to the profits or remuneration of public entertainers such as stage, motion picture or radio artists, musicians and athletes.
- 10.—(1) Any pension (other than a pension paidby the Government of Brunei for services rendered to it in the discharge of governmental functions) and any annuity, derived from sources within Bruneiby an individual who is a resident of the United Kingdom and subject to UnitedKingdom tax in respect thereof, shall be exempt from Brunei tax.
- (2) Any pension (other than a pension paidby the Government of the United Kingdom for services rendered to it in the discharges of governmental functions) and any annuity, derived from sources within the United Kingdom by an individual who is a resident of Brunei and subject to Brunei tax in respect thereof, shall be exempt from United Kingdomtax.
- (3) The term "annuity" means a stated sum payable periodically at stated times, during life or during a specified or ascertainable periodof time, under an obligation to make the payments in consideration of moneypaid.
- 11. A student or business apprentice from one ofthe territories who is receiving full-time education or training in the other territory shall be exempt from tax in that other territory on payments made to him by persons in the first-mentioned territory for the purposes of hismaintenance, education or training.
- 12.—(1) Subject to the provisions of the lawof the United Kingdom regarding the allowances as a credit against UnitedKingdom tax of tax payable in a territory outside the United Kingdom, Bruneitax payable, whether directly or by deduction, in respect of income from sourceswithin Brunei shall be allowed as a credit against any United Kingdom taxpayable in respect of that income.
- (2) Subject to the provisions of the lawof Brunei regarding the allowance as a credit against Brunei of tax payablein a territory outside Brunei, United Kingdom tax payable, whether directlyor by deduction, in respect of income from sources within the United Kingdomshall be allowed as a credit against any Brunei tax payable in respect ofthat income. Where such income is an ordinary dividend paid by a company residentin the United Kingdom, the credit shall take into account (in addition toany United Kingdom income tax appropriate to the dividend) the United Kingdomprofits tax payable by the company in respect of its profits, and where itis a dividend paid on participating preference shares and representing botha dividend at the fixed rate to which the shares are entitled and an additional participation in profits, the profits, tax so payable by the company shall likewise be taken into account in so far as the dividend exceeds that fixed rate.
- (3) For the purposes of this paragraph profitsor remuneration for personal (including professional) services performed inone of the territories shall be deemed to be income from sources within thatterritory, and the services of an individual whose services are wholly ormainly performed in ships or aircraft operated by a resident of one of theterritories shall be deemed to be performed in that territory.
- (4) Where Brunei income tax is payable for a year for which this Arrangement has effect in respect of any income in respectof which United Kingdom income tax is payable for a year prior to the yearbeginning on the 6th April, 1950, then—
  - (a) in the case of a person resident in Brunei, the Brunei income tax shall, for the purposes of sub-paragraph (2) of this paragraph, be deemed to be reduced by the amount of any relief allowable in respect thereof under the provisions of Section 27 of the United Kingdom Finance Act, 1920; and
  - (b) in the case of a person resident in the United Kingdom, the provisions of Section 39 of the Brunei Income Tax Enactment, 1949, shall-apply for the purposes of the allowance of relief from the Brunei tax.

- 13.—(1) The taxation authorities of the UnitedKingdom and Brunei shall exchange such information (being information availableunder their respective taxation laws) as is necessary for carrying out theprovisions of this Arrangement or for the prevention of fraud or the administration of statutory provisions against legal avoidance in relation to the taxes whichare the subject of this Arrangement. Any information so exchanged shall betreated as secret and shall not be disclosed to any persons other than thoseconcerned with the assessment and collection of the taxes which are the subject of this arrangement. No information shall be exchanged which would disclose any trade secret or trade process.
- (2) As used in this paragraph, the term "taxation authorities" means the Commissioners of Inland Revenue or their authorized representative in the case of the United Kingdom and the Collector of Income Tax or his authorized representative in the case of Brunei.
- 14. This Arrangement shall come into force on thedate on which the last of all such things shall have been done in the UnitedKingdom and Brunei as are necessary to give the Arrangement the force of lawin the United Kingdom and Brunei respectively, and shall thereupon have effect—
  - (a) In the United Kingdom:

As respects income tax, for any year of assessment beginning onor after the 6th April, 1950; as respects surtax, for any year of assessmentbeginning on or after the 6th April, 1949; and as respects profits tax, inrespect of the following profits—

- (i) Profits arising in any chargeable accountingperiod beginning on or after the 1st April, 1950;
- (ii) profits attributable to so much of anychargeable accounting period falling partly before and partly after that dateas falls after that date;
- (iii) profits not so arising or attributable by reference to which income tax is, or but for the present Arrangement wouldbe, chargeable for any year of assessment beginning on or after the 6th April,1950;

## (b) Brunei:

As respects income tax, for the year of assessment beginning on the first day of January, 1950, and subsequent years.

- 15. This Arrangement shall continue in effect indefinitely but either of the Governments may, on or before the 30th day of June in any calendar year after the year 1951, give notice of termination to the other Government and, in such event, this Arrangement shall cease to be effective—
  - (a) in the United Kingdom:

As respects income tax, for any year of assessment beginning onor after the 6th April in the calendar year next following that in which thenotice is given; as respects surtax, for any year of assessment beginning on or after the 6th April in the calendar year in which the notice is given; and as respects profits tax, in respect of the following profits—

- (i) profits arising in any chargeable accountingperiod beginning on or after the 1st April in the calendar year next followingthat in which the notice is given;
- (ii) profits attributable to so much of anychargeable accounting period falling partly before and partly after that dateas falls after that date;
- (iii) profits not so arising or attributable by reference to which income tax is chargeable for any year of assessment beginning on or after the 6th April in that next following calendar year;

## (b) In Brunei:

As respects income tax, for any year of assessment beginning onor after the first day of January in the calendar year next following thatin which such notice is given.

#### **EXPLANATORY NOTE**

The Finance (No. 2) Act, 1945, provides for double taxation arrangements with other countries to be given statutory effect by Order in Council. Any such Order is required to be laidbefore the House of Commons in draft.

Under the Arrangement with Brunei which is scheduled to this Order, certain classes of income derived from one country by a resident of the othercountry are (subject to certain conditions) to be exempt from tax in the formercountry; these classes are shipping and air transport profits, certain tradingprofits not arising through a "permanent establishment", patentand copyright royalties, pensions other than Government pensions, purchasedannuities and earnings of temporary business visitors. Government salariesare normally to be taxed by the paying Government only.
