MERCHANT SHIPPING

The Carriage of Goods By Sea (Bermuda) Order 1980

Made - - - - 13th October 1980 Coming into Operation 1st December 1980

At the Court at Buckingham Palace, the 13thday of October 1980

Present,

The Queen's Most Excellent Majesty in Council

Her Majesty, in exercise of the powers conferred upon Her by section 4 of the Carriage of Goods by Sea Act 1971 and of allother powers enabling Her in that behalf, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

- 1. This Order may be cited as the Carriage of Goods by Sea (Bermuda) Order 1980and shall come into operation on 1st December 1980.
- **2.** The Carriageof Goods by Sea Act 1971, subject to the exceptions, adaptations and notifications as set out in the Schedule hereto, shall extend to Bermuda.
- **3.** Save as is expressly provided otherwisetherein, any reference in the Schedule to this Order to any enactment of the United Kingdom shall be construed as a reference to that enactment as applyingor extended to Bermuda.

SCHEDULE TO THE ORDER

Article 2

THE CARRIAGE OF GOODS BY SEA ACT 1971

Application of Hague Rules as amended

- 1.—(1) In this Act, "the Rules" means the InternationalConvention for the unification of certain rules of law relating to bills oflading signed at Brussels on 25th August 1924, as amended by the Protocol signed at Brussels on 23rd February 1968.
 - (2) The provisions of the Rules, as set out in the Schedule to this Act, shall have the force of law.
- (3) Without prejudice to subsection (2) above, the said provisions shallhave effect (and have the force of law) in relation to and in connection withthe carriage of goods by sea in ships where the port of shipment is a portin Bermuda whether or not the carriage is between ports in two different Stateswithin the meaning of Article Xof the Rules.
- (4) Subject to subsection (6) below, nothing in this sectionshall be taken as applying anything in the Rules to any contract for the carriageof goods by sea, unless the contract expressly or by implication provides for the issue of a bill of lading or any similar document of title.
- (5) The Governor may from time to time byorder specify the respective amounts which for the purposes of paragraph 5 of Article IV of the Rules and Article IV bis of the Rules are to be taken as equivalent to the sums expressed in francs which are mentioned in sub-paragraph (a) of that paragraph.
- (6) Without prejudice to Article X(c) of the Rules, the Rules shallhave the force of law in relation to—
 - (a) any bill of lading if the contract contained nor evidenced by it expressly provides that the Rules shall govern the contract, and
 - (b) any receipt which is a non-negotiabledocument marked as such if the contract contained in or evidenced by it is a contract for the carriage of goods by sea which expressly provides that Rules are to govern the contract as if the receipt were a bill of lading,

but subject, where paragraph (b)applies, to any necessary modifications and in particular with the omissionin Article IIIof the Rules of the second sentence of paragraph4 and of paragraph 7.

(7) If and so far as the contract contained nor evidenced by a bill of lading or receipt within paragraph (a) or (b) of subsection(6) above applies to deck cargo or live animals, the Rules as given the force of law by that subsection shall have effect asif Article I(c)did not exclude deck cargo and live animals.

In this subsection "deck cargo" means cargo which by the contract of carriage is stated as being carried on deck and is so carried.

Contracting States, etc

- **2.**—(1) If Her Majesty by Order in Council madeunder this section as it applies in the United Kingdom certifies to the following effect, that is to say, that for the purposes of the Rules—
 - (a) a State specified in the Order is a contractingState, or is a contracting State in respect of any place or territory so specified;

or

(b) any place or territory specified in the Order forms part of a State so specified (whether a contracting State or not),

the Order shall, except so far as it has been superseded by a subsequentOrder, be conclusive evidence of the matters so certified.

Absolute warranty of seaworthiness not to be implied in contracts to which Rules apply

3. There shall not be implied any contract for the carriage of goods by sea to which the Rules applyby virtue of this Act any absolute undertaking by the carrier of the goodsto provide a seaworthy ship.

Supplemental

- **6.**—(1) This Act may be cited as the Carriage of Goods by Sea Act 1971.
- (4) It is hereby declared that for the purposes of Article VIII of the Rules section 502 of the Merchant Shipping Act 1894 (which, as amended by the Merchant Shipping (Liability of Shipowners and Others) Act 1958 (1), entirely exempts shippowners and others in certain circumstances from liability for loss of or damage to, goods) is a provision relating to limitation of liability.
- (5) This Act shall come into force on suchday as the Governor may by Order appoint, and, for the purposes of the transition from the law in force immediately before the day appointed under this subsection to the provisions of this Act, the Order appointing the day may provided that those provisions shall have effect subject to such transitional provisions as may be contained in the Order.

SCHEDULE TO THE ACT

THE HAGUE RULES AS AMENDED BY THE BRUSSELS PROTOCOL1968

ARTICLE I

In these Rules the following words are employed, with the meanings set out below:—

- (a) "Carrier" includes the owner or the chartererwho enters into a contract of carriage with a shipper.
- (b) "Contractof carriage" applies only to contractsof carriage covered by a bill of lading or any similar document of title, in so far as such document relates to the carriage of goods by sea, includingany bill of lading or any similar document as aforesaid issued under or pursuantto a charter party from the moment at which such bill of lading or similardocument of title regulates the relations between a carrier and a holder of the same.
- (c) "Goods" includes goods, wares, merchandise, and articles of every kind whatsoever except live animals and cargo whichby the contract of carriage is stated as being carried on deck and is so carried.
- (d) "Ship" means any vessel used for the carriageof goods by sea.
- (e) "Carriageof goods" covers the period from the time when the goods are loaded on to the time they are discharged from the ship.

ARTICLE II

Subject to the provisions of Article VI, under every contract of carriageof goods by sea the carrier, in relation to the loading, handling, stowage, carriage, custody, care and discharge of such goods, shall be subject to theresponsibilities and liabilities, and entitled to the rights and immunitieshereinafter set forth.

ARTICLE III

- 1. The carrier shall be bound before and at the beginning of the voyage to exercise due diligence to—
 - (a) Make the ship seaworthy.
 - (b) Properly man, equip and supply the ship.
 - (c) Make the holds, refrigerating and coolchambers, and all other parts of the ship in which goods are carried, fitand safe for their reception, carriage and preservation.
- **2.** Subject to the provisions of Article IV, the carrier shall properly and carefully load, handle, stow, carry, keep, care for, and discharge the goodscarried.
- **3.** After receiving the goods into his charge the carrier or the master or agent of the carrier shall, on demand of the shipper, issue to the shipper a bill of lading showing among other things—
 - (a) The leading marks necessary for identification of the goods as the same are furnished in writing by the shipper before theloading of such goods starts, provided such marks are stamped or otherwiseshown clearly upon the goods if uncovered, or on the cases or coverings inwhich such goods are contained, in such manner as should ordinarily remainlegible until the end of the voyage.
 - (b) Either the number of packages or pieces, or the quantity, or weight, as the case may be, as furnished in writing bythe shipper.
 - (c) The apparent order and condition of the goods.

Provided that no carrier, master or agent of the carriershall be bound to state or show in the bill of lading any marks, number, quantity, or weight which he has reasonable ground for suspecting not accurately torepresent the goods actually received, or which he has had no reasonable means of checking.

- **4.** Such a bill of lading shall be primafacie evidence of the receipt by the carrier of the goods as thereindescribed in accordance with paragraph 3(a), (b) and (c). However, proof to the contrary shall not be admissible when the bill of ladinghas been transferred to a third party acting in good faith.
- **5.** The shipper shall be deemed to have guaranteedto the carrier the accuracy at the time of shipment of the marks, number, quantity and weight, as furnished by him, and the shipper shall indemnify the carrier against all loss, damages and expenses arising or resulting frominaccuracies in such particulars. The right of the carrier to such indemnity shall in no way limit his responsibility and liability under the contractof carriage to any person other than the shipper.
- **6.** Unless notice of loss or damage and the generalnature of such loss or damage be given in writing to the carrier or his agentat the port of discharge before or at the time of the removal of the goodsinto the custody of the person entitled to delivery thereof under the contractof carriage, or, if the loss or damage be not apparent, within three days, such removal shall be prima facie evidence of the deliveryby the carrier of the goods as described in the bill of lading.

The notice in writing need not be given if the state of the goodshas, at the time of their receipt, been the subject of joint survey or inspection.

Subject to paragraph 6 *bis* the carrier and the ship shall in any event be discharged from all liability whatsoeverin respect of the goods, unless suit is brought within one year of their deliveryor of the date when they should have been delivered. This period may, however, be extended if the parties so agree after the cause of action has arisen.

In the case of any actual or apprehended loss or damagethe carrier and the receiver shall give all reasonable facilities to eachother for inspecting and tallying the goods.

- **6 bis.** An action for indemnity against a thirdperson may be brought even after the expiration of the year provided for inthe preceding paragraph if brought within the time allowed by the law of the Court seized of the case. However, the time allowed shall be not less than three months, commencing from the day when the person bringing such action for indemnity has settled the claim or has been served with process in the action against himself.
- 7. After the goods are loaded the bill of ladingto be issued by the carrier, master, or agent of the carrier, to the shippershall, if the shipper so demands, be a "shipped" bill of lading, provided that if the shipper shall have previously taken up any document oftitle to such goods, he shall surrender the same as against the issue of the "shipped" bill of lading, but at the option of the carrier suchdocument of title may be noted at the port of shipment by the carrier, master, or agent with the name or names of the ship or ships upon which the goodshave been shipped and the date or dates of shipment, and when so noted, if it shows the particulars mentioned in paragraph3 of Article III, shall for the purpose of this article be deemed to constitute a "shipped" bill of lading.
- **8.** Any clause, covenant, or agreement in a contractof carriage relieving the carrier or the ship from liability for loss or damageto, or in connection with, goods arising from negligence, fault, or failurein the duties and obligations provided in this article or lessening such liabilityotherwise than as provided in these Rules, shall be null and void and of noeffect. A benefit of insurance in favour of the carrier or similar clauseshall be deemed to be a clause relieving the carrier from liability.

ARTICLE IV

- 1. Neither the carrier nor the ship shall be liablefor loss or damage arising or resulting from unseaworthiness unless causedby want of due diligence on the part of the carrier to make the ship seaworthy, and to secure that the ship is properly manned, equipped and supplied, andto make the holds, refrigerating and cool chambers and all other parts of the ship in which goods are carried fit and safe for their reception, carriageand preservation in accordance with the provisions of paragraph 1 of Article III. Whenever loss ordamage has resulted from unseaworthiness the burden of proving the exercise of due diligence shall be on the carrier or other person claiming exemption under this article.
 - 2. Neither the carrier nor the ship shall be responsible for loss or damage arising or resulting from
 - (a) Act, neglect, or default of the master,mariner, pilot, or the servants of the carrier in the navigation or in themanagement of the ship.
 - (b) Fire, unless caused by the actual faultor privity of the carrier.
 - (c) Perils, dangers and accidents of thesea or other navigable waters.
 - (d) Act of God.
 - (e) Act of war.
 - (f) Act of public enemies.
 - (g) Arrest or restraint of princes, rulersor people, or seizure under legal process.
 - (h) Quarantine restrictions.
 - (i) Act or omission of the shipper or owner of the goods, his agent or representative.
 - (j) Strikes or lockouts or stoppage or restraintof labour from whatever cause, whether partial or general.
 - (k) Riots and civil commotions.
 - (1) Saving or attempting to save life orproperty at sea.
 - (m) Wastage in bulk or weight or any otherloss or damage arising from inherent defect, quality or vice of the goods.

- (n) Insufficiency of packing.
- (o) Insufficiency or inadequacy of marks.
- (p) Latent defects not discoverable by duediligence.
- (q) Any other cause arising without the actualfault or privity of the carrier, or without the fault or neglect of the agentsor servants of the carrier, but the burden of proof shall be on the personclaiming the benefit of this exception to show that neither the actual faultor privity of the carrier nor the fault or neglect of the agents or servantsof the carrier contributed to the loss or damage.
- **3.** The shipper shall not be responsible for lossor damage sustained by the carrier or the ship arising or resulting from anycause without the act, fault or neglect of the shipper, his agents or hisservants.
- **4.** Any deviation in saving or attempting to savelife or property at sea or any reasonable deviation shall not be deemed tobe an infringement or breach of these Rules or of the contract of carriage, and the carrier shall not be liable for any loss or damage resulting therefrom.
 - (a) Unless the nature and value of such goodshave been declared by the shipper before shipment and inserted in the billof lading, neither the carrier nor the ship shall in any event be or becomeliable for any loss or damage to or in connection with the goods in an amountexceeding the equivalent of 10,000 francs per package or unit or 30 francsper kilo of gross weight of the goods lost or damaged, whichever is the higher.
 - (b) The total amount recoverable shall becalculated by reference to the value of such goods at the place and time atwhich the goods are discharged from the ship in accordance with the contractor should have been so discharged.
 - The value of the goods shall be fixed according to the commodity exchange price, or, if there be no such price, according to the current marketprice, or, if there be no commodity exchange price or current market price, by reference to the normal value of goods of the same kind and quality.
 - (c) Where a container, pallet or similararticle of transport is used to consolidate goods, the number of packagesor units enumerated in the bill of lading as packed in such article of transportshall be deemed the number of packages or units for the purpose of this paragraphas far as these packages or units are concerned. Except as aforesaid sucharticle of transport shall be considered the package or unit.
 - (d) A franc means a unit consisting of 65·5milligrammes of gold of millesimal fineness 900. The date of conversion of the sum awarded into national currencies shall be governed by the law of the Court seized of the case.
 - (e) Neither the carrier nor the ship shallbe entitled to the benefit of the limitation of liability provided for inthis paragraph if it is proved that the damage resulted from an act or omission of the carrier done with intent to cause damage, or recklessly and with knowledgethat damage would probably result.
 - (f) The declaration mentioned in sub-paragraph (a) of this paragraph, if embodied in the bill of lading, shall be prima facie evidence, but shallnot be binding or conclusive on the carrier.
 - (g) By agreement between the carrier, masteror agent of the carrier and the shipper other maximum amounts than those mentioned in sub-paragraph (a)of this paragraph may be fixed, provided that no maximum amount to fixed shallbe less than the appropriate maximum mentioned in that sub-paragraph.
 - (h) Neither the carrier nor the ship shallbe responsible in any event for loss or damage to, or in connection with, goods if the nature or value thereof has been knowingly mis-stated by the shipper in the bill of lading.

6. Goods of an inflammable, explosive or dangerousnature to the shipment whereof the carrier, master or agent of the carrierhas not consented with knowledge of their nature and character, may at anytime before discharge be landed at any place, or destroyed or rendered innocuousby the carrier without compensation and the shipper of such goods shall beliable for all damages and expenses directly or indirectly arising out ofor resulting from such shipment. If any such goods shipped with such knowledgeand consent shall become a danger to the ship or cargo, they may in like mannerbe landed at any place, or destroyed or rendered innocuous by the carrierwithout liability on the part of the carrier except to general average, ifany.

ARTICLE IV BIS

- 1. The defences and limits of liability provided for in these Rules shall apply in any action against the carrier in respect of loss or damage to goods covered by a contract of carriage whether the action be founded in contract or in tort.
- **2.** If such an action is brought against a servantor agent of the carrier (such servant or agent not being an independent contractor), such servant or agent shall be entitled to avail himself of the defences and limits of liability which the carrier is entitled to invoke under these Rules.
- **3.** The aggregate of the amounts recoverable from the carrier, and such servants and agents, shall in no case exceed the limitprovided for in these Rules.
- **4.** Nevertheless, a servant or agent of the carriershall not be entitled to avail himself of the provisions of this article, if it is proved that the damage resulted from an act or omission of the servantor agent done with intent to cause damage or recklessly and with knowledgethat damage would probably result.

ARTICLE V

A carrier shall be at liberty to surrender inwhole or in part all or any of his rights and immunities or to increase anyof his responsibilities and obligations under these Rules, provided such surrenderor increase shall be embodied in the bill of lading issued to the shipper. The provisions of these Rules shall not be applicable to charter parties, but if bills of lading are issued in the case of a ship under a charter partythey shall comply with the terms of these Rules. Nothing in these Rules shallbe held to prevent the insertion in a bill of lading of any lawful provisionregarding general average.

ARTICLE VI

Notwithstanding the provisions of the precedingarticles, a carrier, master or agent of the carrier and a shipper shall inregard to any particular goods be at liberty to enter into any agreement inany terms as to the responsibility and liability of the carrier for such goods, and as to the rights and immunities of the carrier in respect of such goods, or his obligation as to seaworthiness, so far as this stipulation is not contraryto public policy, or the care or diligence of his servants or agents in regardto the loading, handling, stowage, carriage, custody, care and discharge ofthe goods carried by sea, provided that in this case no bill of lading hasbeen or shall be issued and that the terms agreed shall be embodied in a receiptwhich shall be a non-negotiable document and shall be marked as such.

Any agreement so entered into shall have full legal effect.

Provided that this article shall not apply to ordinary commercial shipments made in the ordinary course of trade, but only to othershipments where the character or condition of the property to be carried orthe circumstances, terms and conditions under which the carriage is to be performed are such as reasonably to justify a special agreement.

ARTICLE VII

Nothing herein contained shall prevent a carrieror a shipper from entering into any agreement, stipulation, condition, reservationor exemption as to the responsibility and liability of the carrier or theship for the loss or damage to, or in connection with, the custody and careand handling of goods prior to the loading on, and subsequent to the dischargefrom, the ship on which the goods are carried by sea.

ARTICLE VIII

The provisions of these Rules shall not affect the rights and obligations of the carrier under any statute for the time beingin force relating to the limitation of the liability of owners of sea-goingvessels.

ARTICLE IX

These Rules shall not affect the provisions of any international Convention or national law governing liability for nucleardamage.

ARTICLE X

The provisions of these Rules shall apply to everybill of lading relating to the carriage of goods between ports in two differentStates if:

- (a) the bill of lading is issued in a contractingState, or
- (b) the carriage is from a port in a contractingState, or
- (c) the contract contained in or evidencedby the bill of lading provides that these Rules or legislation of any Stategiving effect to them are to govern the contract,

whatever may be the nationality of the ship, the carrier, the shipper, the consignee, or any other interested person.

EXPLANATORY NOTE

This Order extends to Bermuda, with the necessary adaptations,the Carriage of Goods by Sea Act 1971, which gives effect to the International Convention for the Unification of certain Rules of Lawrelating to Bills of Lading ("the Hague Rules") signed at Brusselson 25th August 1924 (Cmd. 3806), as amended by the protocol signed at Brussels on 23rd February 1968(Cmnd. 6944).
