## ROAD TRAFFIC

## The M25 Motorway (Junctions 6 - 5, Clacket Lane) (Temporary Restriction of Traffic) Order 2011

Made - - - - 7th February 2011

Coming into force - - 26th February 2011

WHEREAS the Secretary of State for Transport, being the traffic authority for the M25 Motorway is satisfied that traffic should be restricted on a length of that motorway because works are proposed to be executed thereon:

NOW, THEREFORE, the Secretary of State, in exercise of the powers conferred by section 14(1)(a) of the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984(a), hereby makes the following Order:-

- **1.** This Order may be cited as the M25 Motorway (Junctions 6 5, Clacket Lane) (Temporary Restriction of Traffic) Order 2011 and shall come into force on 26th February 2011.
  - 2. In this Order:

"the M25" means the M25 Motorway in the County of Surrey;

"the length of anti-clockwise carriageway" means the anti-clockwise carriageway of the M25 between points 520 metres west of Water Lane underbridge (at marker post 36.8) and 6 metres west of Clacket Lane overbridge (at marker post 33.8);

"works" mean carriageway drainage improvement work on the motorway; and

- "the works period" means the period of starting on Monday 28th February 2011 and ending on 25th August 2012.
- **3.** Subject as mentioned in article 4 below, no person shall, during the works period, drive any motor vehicle at a speed exceeding 50 miles per hour on the length of anti-clockwise carriageway.
- **4.** The provisions of article 3 above shall apply only at such times and to such extent as shall from time to time be indicated by traffic signs, and shall not apply to a vehicle being used for police, ambulance or fire and rescue authority purposes.
