The Double Taxation Relief and International Tax Enforcement (Senegal) Order 2015

Made - - - - 11th November 2015

At the Court at Buckingham Palace, the 11th day of November 2015 Present,

The Queen's Most Excellent Majesty in Council

A draft of this Order was laid before the House of Commons in accordance with section 5(2) of the Taxation (International and Other Provisions) Act 2010(1) and section 173(7) of the Finance Act 2006(2) and approved by a resolution of that House.

Accordingly, Her Majesty, in exercising the powers conferred upon Her by section 2 of the Taxation (International and Other Provisions) Act 2010 and section 173(1) to (3) of the Finance Act 2006, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, orders as follows—

Citation

1. This Order may be cited as the Double Taxation Relief and International Tax Enforcement (Senegal) Order 2015.

Double taxation and international tax enforcement arrangements to have effect

- **2.** It is declared that—
 - (a) the arrangements specified in the Convention set out in the Schedule to this Order have been made with the Government of the Republic of Senegal;
 - (b) the arrangements have been made with a view to affording relief from double taxation in relation to capital gains tax, corporation tax and income tax and taxes of a similar

character imposed by the laws of the Republic of Senegal and for the purposes of assisting international tax enforcement; and

(c) it is expedient that those arrangements should have effect.

SCHEDULE

Article 2

CONVENTION BETWEEN THE GOVERNMENT OF THE UNITED KINGDOM OF GREAT BRITAIN AND NORTHERN IRELAND AND TI GOVERNMENT OF THE REPUBLIC OF SENEGAL FOR THE AVOIDAL OF DOUBLE TAXATION AND THE PREVENTION OF FISCAL EVASION WITH RESPECT TO TAXES ON INCOME AND ON CAPITAL GAINS

The Government of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland and the Government of the Republic of Senegal;

Desiring to conclude a Convention for the avoidance of double taxation and the prevention of fiscal evasion with respect to taxes on income and on capital gains;

Have agreed as follows:

ARTICLE 1

Persons Covered

This Convention shall apply to persons who are residents of one or both of the Contracting St

ARTICLE 2

Taxes Covered

- This Convention shall apply to taxes on income and on capital gains imposed on beh a Contracting State or of its political subdivisions or local authorities, irrespective of the man which they are levied.
- There shall be regarded as taxes on income and on capital gains all taxes imposed on income, or on elements of income, including taxes on gains from the alienation of movable or immovable property.
- 3. The existing taxes to which the Convention shall apply are in particular:
 - a) in Senegal:
 - the income tax on companies;
 - (ii) the minimum income tax on companies;
 - (iii) the income tax on individuals; and
 - (iv) the capital gains tax on developed and undeveloped land;

(hereinafter referred to as "Senegalese tax"):

(iii) the capital gains tax;

(hereinafter referred to as "United Kingdom tax").

4. The Convention shall apply also to any identical or substantially similar taxes that ar imposed after the date of signature of the Convention in addition to, or in place of, the existin taxes. The competent authorities of the Contracting States shall notify each other of any significant changes that have been made in their taxation laws.

ARTICLE 3

General Definitions

- For the purposes of this Convention, unless the context otherwise requires:
 - the term "Senegal" means the Republic of Senegal and, from the geographical point view, includes the national territory, the territorial waters as well as the maritime are over which, in accordance with international law, Senegal exercises sovereign rights jurisdiction;
 - b) the term "United Kingdom" means Great Britain and Northern Ireland, including any outside the territorial sea of the United Kingdom designated under its laws concernin Continental Shelf and in accordance with international law as an area within which the rights of the United Kingdom with respect to the sea bed and subsoil and their natural resources may be exercised;
 - the terms "a Contracting State" and "the other Contracting State" mean Senegal or th United Kingdom, as the context requires;
 - d) the term "person" includes an individual, a company and any other body of persons;
 - the term "company" means any body corporate or any entity that is treated as a body corporate for tax purposes;
 - f) the term "enterprise" applies to the carrying on of any business;
 - g) the terms "enterprise of a Contracting State" and "enterprise of the other Contracting State" mean respectively an enterprise carried on by a resident of a Contracting State an enterprise carried on by a resident of the other Contracting State;
 - the term "international traffic" means any transport by a ship or aircraft operated by a enterprise of a Contracting State, except when the ship or aircraft is operated solely between places in the other Contracting State;
 - i) the term "competent authority" means:
 - in Senegal, the Minister in charge of Finance or his authorised representative; and

- (ii) in relation to the United Kingdom, any British citizen, or any British sub not possessing the citizenship of any other Commonwealth country or territory, provided he has the right of abode in the United Kingdom; and legal person, partnership or association deriving its status as such from t laws in force in the United Kingdom;
- the term "business" includes the performance of professional services and of other activities of an independent character;
- the term "pension scheme" means any scheme or other arrangement which:
 - is generally exempt from income taxation; and
 - (ii) operates to administer or provide pension or retirement benefits or to ea income for the benefit of one or more such arrangements.
- 2. As regards the application of the Convention at any time by a Contracting State, any not defined therein shall, unless the context otherwise requires, have the meaning that it has a time under the law of that State for the purposes of the taxes to which this Convention applies meaning under the applicable tax laws of that State prevailing over a meaning given to the ter under other laws of that State.

Resident

- 1. For the purposes of this Convention, the term "resident of a Contracting State" mean person who, under the laws of that State, is liable to tax therein by reason of his domicile, residence, place of management, place of incorporation or any other criterion of a similar natural and also includes that State and any political subdivision or local authority thereof. This term however, does not include any person who is liable to tax in that State in respect only of incorporation gains from sources in that State.
- The term "resident of a Contracting State" includes
 - a) a pension scheme established in that State; and
 - b) an organisation that is established and is operated exclusively for religious, charitable scientific, cultural, or educational purposes (or for more than one of those purposes) that is a resident of that State according to its laws, notwithstanding that all or part of income or gains may be exempt from tax under the domestic law of that State.
- 3. Where by reason of the provisions of paragraph 1 an individual is a resident of both Contracting States, then his status shall be determined as follows:
 - a) he shall be deemed to be a resident only of the State in which he has a permanent hor available to him; if he has a permanent home available to him in both States, he shall deemed to be a resident only of the State with which his personal and economic relatare closer (centre of vital interests);

4. Where by reason of the provisions of paragraph 1 a person other than an individual is resident of both Contracting States, then the competent authorities of the Contracting States of endeavour to determine by mutual agreement the Contracting State of which that person shall deemed to be a resident for the purposes of this Convention. In the absence of a mutual agree by the competent authorities of the Contracting States, the person shall not be considered a resident of either Contracting State for the purposes of claiming any benefits provided by the Convention, except those provided by paragraph 3 of Article 21 and Articles 23 and 24.

ARTICLE 5

Permanent Establishment

- For the purposes of this Convention, the term "permanent establishment" means a fix place of business through which the business of an enterprise is wholly or partly carried on.
- The term "permanent establishment" includes especially:
 - a) a place of management;
 - b) a branch;
 - c) an office;
 - d) a factory;
 - e) a workshop; and
 - f) a mine, an oil or gas well, a quarry or any other place of extraction of natural resource
- A building site or construction or installation project constitutes a permanent establishment only if it lasts more than six months.
- The term "permanent establishment" also encompasses:
 - the furnishing of services by an enterprise through employees or other personnel eng by the enterprise for such purpose, but only if activities of that nature continue (for the same or a connected project) within a Contracting State for a period or periods aggregating more than 183 days within any twelve-month period commencing or end in the fiscal year concerned;
 - b) for an individual, the performing of services in a Contracting State by that individual only if the individual's stay in that State is for a period or periods aggregating more t 183 days within any twelve-month period commencing or ending in the fiscal year concerned.
- 5. Notwithstanding the preceding provisions of this Article, the term "permanent establishment" shall be deemed not to include:
 - the use of facilities solely for the purpose of storage, display or delivery of goods or

- the maintenance of a fixed place of business solely for the purpose of purchasing goo merchandise, or of collecting information, for the enterprise;
- the maintenance of a fixed place of business solely for the purpose of carrying on, for enterprise, any other activity of a preparatory or auxiliary character;
- f) the maintenance of a fixed place of business solely for any combination of activities mentioned in sub-paragraphs a) to e), provided that the overall activity of the fixed place of business resulting from this combination is of a preparatory or auxiliary character.
- 6. Notwithstanding the provisions of paragraphs 1 and 2, where a person other than an agent of an independent status to whom paragraph 7 applies is acting on behalf of an enterprise and has, and habitually exercises, in a Contracting State an authority to conclude contracts on behalf of the enterprise, that enterprise shall be deemed to have a permanent establishment in State in respect of any activities which that person undertakes for the enterprise, unless the activities of such person are limited to those mentioned in paragraph 5 which, if exercised threat fixed place of business, would not make this fixed place of business a permanent establishment under the provisions of that paragraph.
- 7. Notwithstanding the preceding provisions of this Article, an insurance enterprise of a Contracting State shall, except in regard to re-insurance, be deemed to have a permanent establishment in the other Contracting State if it collects premiums in the territory of that other State relating to the insurance of risks situated therein through a person other than an agent of independent status to whom paragraph 8 applies.
- 8. An enterprise shall not be deemed to have a permanent establishment in a Contracting State merely because it carries on business in that State through a broker, general commission agent or any other agent of an independent status, provided that such persons are acting in the ordinary course of their business. However, when the activities of such an agent are devoted wholly or almost wholly on behalf of that enterprise, and conditions are made or imposed between that enterprise and the agent in their commercial and financial relations which differ from tho which would have been made between independent enterprises, he will not be considered an of an independent status within the meaning of this paragraph.
- 9. The fact that a company which is a resident of a Contracting State controls or is cont by a company which is a resident of the other Contracting State, or which carries on business that other State (whether through a permanent establishment or otherwise), shall not of itself constitute either company a permanent establishment of the other.

Income from Immovable Property

- Income derived by a resident of a Contracting State from immovable property (including income from agriculture or forestry) situated in the other Contracting State may be taxed in the other State.
- 2. The term "immovable property" shall have the meaning which it has under the law of Contracting State in which the property in question is situated. The term shall in any case incorporate accessory to immovable property, livestock and equipment used in agriculture and

 The provisions of paragraphs 1 and 3 shall also apply to the income from immovable property of an enterprise.

ARTICLE 7

Business Profits

- The profits of an enterprise of a Contracting State shall be taxable only in that State u
 the enterprise carries on business in the other Contracting State through a permanent establish
 situated therein. If the enterprise carries on business as aforesaid, the profits of the enterprise
 be taxed in the other State, but only so much of them as is attributable to that permanent
 establishment.
- 2. Subject to the provisions of paragraph 3, where an enterprise of a Contracting State carries on business in the other Contracting State through a permanent establishment situated therein, there shall in each Contracting State be attributed to that permanent establishment the profits which it might be expected to make if it were a distinct and separate enterprise engage the same or similar activities under the same or similar conditions and dealing wholly independently with the enterprise of which it is a permanent establishment.
- In determining the profits of a permanent establishment, there shall be allowed as deductions expenses which are incurred for the purposes of the business of the permanent establishment, including executive and general administrative expenses so incurred, whether State in which the permanent establishment is situated or elsewhere. However, no such deduc shall be allowed in respect of amounts, if any, paid (otherwise than towards reimbursement of actual expenses) by the permanent establishment to the head office of the enterprise or any of other offices, by way of royalties, fees or other similar payments in return for the use of pater other rights, or by way of commission, for specific services performed or for management, or except in the case of a banking enterprise, by way of interest on moneys lent to the permanent establishment. Likewise, no account shall be taken, in the determination of the profits of a permanent establishment, for amounts charged (otherwise than towards reimbursement of act expenses), by the permanent establishment to the head office of the enterprise or any of its other. offices, by way of royalties, fees or other similar payments in return for the use of patents or rights, or by way of commission for specific services performed or for management, or, except the case of a banking enterprise, by way of interest on moneys lent to the head office of the enterprise or any of its other offices.
- 4. Insofar as it has been customary in a Contracting State to determine the profits to be attributed to a permanent establishment on the basis of an apportionment of the total profits o enterprise to its various parts, nothing in paragraph 2 shall preclude that Contracting State fro determining the profits to be taxed by such an apportionment as may be customary. The meth apportionment adopted shall, however, be such that the result shall be in accordance with the principles contained in this Article.
- No profits shall be attributed to a permanent establishment by reason of the mere pur by that permanent establishment of goods or merchandise for the enterprise.
- For the purposes of the preceding paragraphs, the profits to be attributed to the perma establishment shall be determined by the same method year by year unless there is good and sufficient reason to the contrary.

Shipping and Air Transport

- Profits from the operation of ships or aircraft in international traffic shall be taxable in the Contracting State in which the place of effective management of the enterprise is situated.
- For the purposes of this Article, profits from the operation of ships or aircraft in international traffic include:
 - a) profits from the rental on a bareboat basis of ships or aircraft; and
 - profits from the use, maintenance or rental of containers (including trailers and relate equipment for the transport of containers) used for the transport of goods or merchan
 - where such rental or such use, maintenance or rental, as the case may be, is incidental to operation of ships or aircraft in international traffic.
- The provisions of paragraph 1 shall also apply to profits from the participation in a p joint business or an international operating agency.

ARTICLE 9

Associated Enterprises

- Where
 - an enterprise of a Contracting State participates directly or indirectly in the manager control or capital of an enterprise of the other Contracting State, or
 - the same persons participate directly or indirectly in the management, control or capi an enterprise of a Contracting State and an enterprise of the other Contracting State,

and in either case conditions are made or imposed between the two enterprises in their common financial relations which differ from those which would be made between independent enterprises, then any profits which would, but for those conditions, have accrued to one of the enterprises, but, by reason of those conditions, have not so accrued, may be included in the profit that enterprise and taxed accordingly.

- 2. Where a Contracting State includes in the profits of an enterprise of that State and accordingly profits on which an enterprise of the other Contracting State has been charged in that other State and the profits so included are profits which would have accrued to the enterprise of the first-mentioned State if the conditions made between the two enterprises had those which would have been made between independent enterprises, then that other State she make an appropriate adjustment to the amount of the tax charged therein on those profits. In determining such adjustment, due regard shall be had to the other provisions of this Conventiand the competent authorities of the Contracting States shall if necessary consult each other.
- A Contracting State is not required to make a corresponding adjustment under paragraph

Dividends

- Dividends paid by a company which is a resident of a Contracting State to a resident the other Contracting State may be taxed in that other State.
- 2. However, such dividends may also be taxed in the Contracting State of which the company paying the dividends is a resident and according to the laws of that State, but if the beneficial owner of the dividends is a resident of the other Contracting State, the tax so charge shall not exceed:
 - a) 5 per cent of the gross amount of the dividends if the beneficial owner is a company which holds directly at least 25 percent of the capital of the company paying the dividends;
 - 8 per cent of the gross amount of the dividends if the beneficial owner is a pension scheme established in that other State;
 - 10 per cent of the gross amount of the dividends in all other cases.

This paragraph shall not affect the taxation of the company in respect of the profits out of the dividends are paid.

- 3. Notwithstanding the provisions of paragraph 2, other than where the beneficial owne the dividends is a pension scheme, dividends paid out of income (including gains) derived dir or indirectly from immovable property within the meaning of Article 6 by an investment vehi resident in a Contracting State whose income from such immoveable property is exempt from and which distributes most of that income annually may also be taxed in that State and accord to the laws of that State, but if the beneficial owner of the dividend is a resident of the other Contracting State, the tax so charged shall not exceed 15 per cent of the gross amount of the dividends.
- 4. The term "dividends" as used in this Article means income from shares, or other right not being debt-claims, participating in profits, as well as any other item which is treated as infrom shares by the taxation laws of the State of which the company making the distribution is resident.
- 5. The provisions of paragraphs 1, 2 and 3 shall not apply if the beneficial owner of the dividends, being a resident of a Contracting State, carries on business in the other Contracting State of which the company paying the dividends is a resident through a permanent establishment situated therein and the holding in respect of which the dividends are paid is effectively connewith such permanent establishment. In such case the provisions of Article 7 shall apply.
- 6. Where a company which is a resident of a Contracting State derives profits or income from the other Contracting State, that other State may not impose any tax on the dividends pathe company, except insofar as such dividends are paid to a resident of that other State or insofas the holding in respect of which the dividends are paid is effectively connected with a perme establishment situated in that other State, nor subject the company's undistributed profits to a

rights in respect of which the dividend is paid to take advantage of this Article by means of the creation or assignment.

ARTICLE 11

Interest

- Interest arising in a Contracting State and paid to a resident of the other Contracting may be taxed in that other State.
- 2. However, such interest may also be taxed in the Contracting State in which it arises a according to the laws of that State, but if the beneficial owner of the interest is a resident of the other Contracting State, the tax so charged shall not exceed 10 per cent of the gross amount o interest. The competent authorities of the Contracting States shall by mutual agreement settle mode of application of this limitation.
- 3. Notwithstanding the provisions of paragraph 2, the Government of a Contracting Sta political subdivisions and local authorities shall be exempt from tax in the other Contracting States in respect of interest derived from that State.
- 4. The term "interest" as used in this Article means income from debt-claims of every k whether or not secured by mortgage and whether or not carrying a right to participate in the debtor's profits, and in particular, income from government securities and income from bonds debentures, including premiums attaching to such securities, bonds or debentures. Penalty ch for late payment shall not be regarded as interest for the purpose of this Article. The term sha not include any item which is treated as a dividend under the provisions of Article 10.
- 5. The provisions of paragraphs 1 and 2 shall not apply if the beneficial owner of the interest, being a resident of a Contracting State, carries on business in the other Contracting S in which the interest arises through a permanent establishment situated therein and the debt-c in respect of which the interest is paid is effectively connected with such permanent establish In such case the provisions of Article 7 shall apply.
- 6. Interest shall be deemed to arise in a Contracting State when the payer is a resident of State. Where, however, the person paying the interest, whether he is a resident of a Contractin State or not, has in a Contracting State a permanent establishment in connection with which the indebtedness on which the interest is paid was incurred, and such interest is borne by such permanent establishment, then such interest shall be deemed to arise in the State in which the permanent establishment is situated.
- 7. Where, by reason of a special relationship between the payer and the beneficial owner between both of them and some other person, the amount of the interest paid exceeds, for whatever reason, the amount which would have been agreed upon by the payer and the beneficial owner in the absence of such relationship, the provisions of this Article shall apply only to the last-mentioned amount. In such case, the excess part of the payments shall remain taxable according to the laws of each Contracting State, due regard being had to the other provisions this Convention.
- 8. No relief shall be available under this Article if it was the main purpose or one of the

- However, such royalties may also be taxed in the Contracting State in which they aris
 and according to the laws of that State, but if the beneficial owner of the royalties is a residen
 the other Contracting State, the tax so charged shall not exceed:
 - a) in the case of royalties referred to in sub-paragraph a) of paragraph 3, 10 per cent of a gross amount of the royalties;
 - b) in the case of royalties referred to in sub-paragraph b) of paragraph 3, 10 per cent of adjusted amount of the royalties. For the purpose of this sub-paragraph, "the adjuste amount" means 60 per cent of the gross amount of the royalties.

The competent authorities of the Contracting States shall by mutual agreement settle the mo application of these limitations.

- The term "royalties" as used in this Article means:
 - a) payments of any kind received as a consideration for the use of, or the right to use, as copyright of literary, artistic or scientific work including cinematograph films, any patrade mark, design or model, plan, secret formula or process, or for information (knohow) concerning industrial, commercial or scientific experience, and
 - payments of any kind received as a consideration for the use of, or the right to use, industrial, commercial or scientific equipment.
- 4. The provisions of paragraphs 1 and 2 shall not apply if the beneficial owner of the royalties, being a resident of a Contracting State, carries on business in the other Contracting in which the royalties arise through a permanent establishment situated therein and the right of property in respect of which the royalties are paid is effectively connected with such permane establishment. In such case the provisions of Article 7 shall apply.
- 5. Royalties shall be deemed to arise in a Contracting State when the payer is a resident that State. Where, however, the person paying the royalties, whether he is a resident of a Contracting State or not, has in a Contracting State a permanent establishment in connection which the liability to pay the royalties was incurred, and such royalties are borne by such permanent establishment, then such royalties shall be deemed to arise in the State in which the permanent establishment is situated.
- 6. Where, by reason of a special relationship between the payer and the beneficial owned between both of them and some other person, the amount of the royalties paid exceeds, for whatever reason, the amount which would have been agreed upon by the payer and the beneficial owner in the absence of such relationship, the provisions of this Article shall apply only to the last-mentioned amount. In such case, the excess part of the payments shall remain taxable according to the laws of each Contracting State, due regard being had to the other provisions this Convention.
- 7. No relief shall be available under this Article if it was the main purpose or one of the main purposes of any person concerned with the creation or assignment of the rights in respectively which the royalties are paid to take advantage of this Article by means of that creation or assignment.

- Gains derived by a resident of a Contracting State from the alienation of shares, or comparable interests, deriving more than 50 per cent of their value directly or indirectly from immovable property situated in the other Contracting State may be taxed in that other State.
- 3. Gains from the alienation of movable property forming part of the business property permanent establishment which an enterprise of a Contracting State has in the other Contracti State, including such gains from the alienation of such a permanent establishment (alone or w the whole enterprise), may be taxed in that other State.
- 4. Gains derived by a resident of a Contracting State from the alienation of ships or airc operated in international traffic by an enterprise of that State or movable property pertaining t operation of such ships or aircraft, shall be taxable only in that State.
- 5. Gains, other than those to which paragraph 2 applies, derived by a resident of a Contracting State from the alienation of shares of a company which is a resident of the other Contracting State, may be taxed in that other State if the alienator, at any time during the 12-month period preceding such alienation, held directly or indirectly at least 50 per cent of the capital of that company. The tax in that other State shall be charged on not more than 25 per of the gain.
- Gains from the alienation of any property other than that referred to in paragraphs 1 that shall be taxable only in the Contracting State of which the alienator is a resident.

Income from Employment

- 1. Subject to the provisions of Articles 15, 17, and 18, salaries, wages and other similar remuneration derived by a resident of a Contracting State in respect of an employment shall be taxable only in that State unless the employment is exercised in the other Contracting State. It employment is so exercised, such remuneration as is derived therefrom may be taxed in that of State.
- 2. Notwithstanding the provisions of paragraph 1, remuneration derived by a resident of Contracting State in respect of an employment exercised in the other Contracting State shall be taxable only in the first-mentioned State if:
 - a) the recipient is present in the other State for a period or periods not exceeding in the aggregate 183 days in any twelve month period commencing or ending in the fiscal y concerned; and
 - the remuneration is paid by, or on behalf of, an employer who is not a resident of the other State; and
 - the remuneration is not borne by a permanent establishment which the employer has the other State.

Notwithstanding the preceding provisions of this Article, remuneration derived by a
resident of a Contracting State in respect of an employment exercised aboard a ship or aircraf
operated in international traffic shall be taxable only in that State.

ARTICLE 15

Directors' Fees

Directors' fees and other similar payments derived by a resident of a Contracting State in his capacity as a member of the board of directors of a company which is a resident of the other Contracting State may be taxed in that other State.

ARTICLE 16

Artistes and Sportsmen

- Notwithstanding the provisions of Article 14, income derived by a resident of a Contracting State as an entertainer, such as a theatre, motion picture, radio or television artiste a musician, or as a sportsman, from his personal activities as such exercised in the other Contracting State, may be taxed in that other State.
- 2. Where income in respect of personal activities exercised by an entertainer or a sports in his capacity as such accrues not to the entertainer or sportsman himself but to another personal that income may, notwithstanding the provisions of Articles 7 and 14, be taxed in the Contract State in which the activities of the entertainer or sportsman are exercised.
- 3. The provisions of paragraphs 1 and 2 shall not apply to remuneration or profits derive from activities exercised under a cultural exchange agreement in a Contracting State if the vision that State is wholly or mainly supported by public funds of the other Contracting State or policy subdivisions or local authorities thereof. In such a case, the income or profits shall be taxable in the Contracting State in which the artiste or the sportsman is a resident.

ARTICLE 17

Pensions

Subject to the provisions of paragraph 2 of Article 18, pensions and other similar remune paid to a resident of a Contracting State, shall be taxable only in that State.

ARTICLE 18

Government Service

- a) Salaries, wages and other similar remuneration paid by a Contracting State or a
 political subdivision or a local authority thereof to an individual in respect of

 - However, such pensions and other similar remuneration shall be taxable only i other Contracting State if the individual is a resident of, and a national of, that State.
- The provisions of Articles 14, 15, 16 and 17 shall apply to salaries, wages, pensions, other similar remuneration in respect of services rendered in connection with a business carrie by a Contracting State or a political subdivision or a local authority thereof.

Students

Payments which a student or business apprentice who is or was immediately before visit Contracting State a resident of the other Contracting State and who is present in the mentioned State solely for the purpose of his education or training receives for the purpose maintenance, education or training shall not be taxed in that State, provided that such payarise from sources outside that State.

ARTICLE 20

Other Income

- Items of income beneficially owned by a resident of a Contracting State, wherever arising, not dealt with in the foregoing Articles of this Convention shall be taxable only in that State.
- 2. Notwithstanding the provisions of paragraph 1, where an amount of income is paid to resident of a Contracting State out of income received by trustees or personal representatives administering the estates of deceased persons and those trustees or personal representatives are residents of the other Contracting State, that amount shall be treated as arising from the same sources, and in the same proportions, as the income received by the trustees or personal representatives out of which that amount is paid.

Any tax paid by the trustees or personal representatives in respect of the income paid the beneficiary shall be treated as if it had been paid by the beneficiary.

3. The provisions of paragraph 1 shall not apply to income, other than income from immovable property as defined in paragraph 2 of Article 6, if the beneficial owner of such income being a resident of a Contracting State, carries on business in the other Contracting State through permanent establishment situated therein and the right or property in respect of which the income paid is effectively connected with such permanent establishment. ARTICLE 21

Elimination of Double Taxation

- Where a resident of Senegal derives income which, in accordance with the provision this Convention, may be taxed in the United Kingdom, Senegal shall allow as a deduction fro the tax on the income of that resident an amount equal to the tax paid in the United Kingdom. amount of the deduction, however, shall not exceed that part of the Senegalese tax which is appropriate to that income.
- Where, in accordance with any provision of this Convention, income derived by a
 resident of Senegal is exempted from tax in Senegal, Senegal may nevertheless, in calculating
 amount of tax on the remaining income of such resident, take into account the exempted inco-
- 3. Subject to the provisions of the law of the United Kingdom regarding the allowance credit against United Kingdom tax of tax payable in a territory outside the United Kingdom of the case may be, regarding the exemption from United Kingdom tax of a dividend arising in a territory outside the United Kingdom or of the profits of a permanent establishment situated it territory outside the United Kingdom (which shall not affect the general principle hereof):
 - a) Senegalese tax payable under the laws of Senegal and in accordance with this Convention, whether directly or by deduction, on profits, income or chargeable gains from sources within Senegal (excluding in the case of a dividend tax payable in respet the profits out of which the dividend is paid) shall be allowed as a credit against any United Kingdom tax computed by reference to the same profits, income or chargeable gains by reference to which the Senegalese tax is computed;
 - a dividend which is paid by a company which is a resident of Senegal to a company is a resident of the United Kingdom shall be exempted from United Kingdom tax, where the conditions for exemption under the law of the United Kingdom are met;
 - c) the profits of a permanent establishment in Senegal of a company which is a resident the United Kingdom shall be exempted from United Kingdom tax when the exemption applicable and the conditions for exemption under the law of the United Kingdom are met;
 - d) in the case of a dividend not exempted from tax under sub-paragraph b) above which paid by a company which is a resident of Senegal to a company which is a resident of United Kingdom and which controls directly or indirectly at least 10 per cent of the v power in the company paying the dividend, the credit mentioned in sub-paragraph a) above shall also take into account the Senegalese tax payable by the company in resp of its profits out of which such dividend is paid.

4. For the purposes of paragraph 3, profits, income and gains owned by a resident of the United Kingdom which may be taxed in Senegal in accordance with this Convention shall be deemed to arise from sources in Senegal.

ARTICLE 22

Miscellaneous Provision

Nothing in this Convention shall prejudice the right of each Contracting State to apply its dor laws and measures concerning the prevention of tax evasion and avoidance, whether of described as such, insofar as they do not give rise to taxation contrary to this Convention.

ARTICLE 23

Non-discrimination

- Nationals of a Contracting State shall not be subjected in the other Contracting State
 any taxation or any requirement connected therewith which is other or more burdensome thar
 taxation and connected requirements to which nationals of that other State in the same
 circumstances, in particular with respect to residence, are or may be subjected.
- The taxation on a permanent establishment which an enterprise of a Contracting State
 in the other Contracting State shall not be less favourably levied in that other State than the
 taxation levied on enterprises of that other State carrying on the same activities.
- 3. Except where the provisions of paragraph 1 of Article 9, paragraph 7 or 8 of Article 2 paragraph 6 or 7 of Article 12, or paragraph 4 or 5 of Article 20 apply, interest, royalties and disbursements paid by an enterprise of a Contracting State to a resident of the other Contracting State shall, for the purpose of determining the taxable profits of such enterprise, be deductible under the same conditions as if they had been paid to a resident of the first-mentioned State.
- 4. Enterprises of a Contracting State, the capital of which is wholly or partly owned or controlled, directly or indirectly, by one or more residents of the other Contracting State, shal be subjected in the first-mentioned State to any taxation or any requirement connected therew which is other or more burdensome than the taxation and connected requirements to which of similar enterprises of the first-mentioned State are or may be subjected.
- Nothing contained in this Article shall be construed as obliging either Contracting St grant to individuals not resident in that State any of the personal allowances, reliefs and reduct for tax purposes which are granted to individuals so resident or to its nationals.

ARTICLE 24

Mutual Agreement Procedure

Where a person considers that the actions of one or both of the Contracting States resor will result for him in taxation not in accordance with the provisions of this Convention, he irrespective of the remedies provided by the domestic law of those States, present his case to competent authority of the Contracting State of which he is a resident or, if his case comes un

- 2. The competent authority shall endeavour, if the objection appears to it to be justified if it is not itself able to arrive at a satisfactory solution, to resolve the case by mutual agreeme with the competent authority of the other Contracting State, with a view to the avoidance of taxation which is not in accordance with this Convention. Any agreement reached shall be implemented notwithstanding any time limits in the domestic law of the Contracting States.
- The competent authorities of the Contracting States shall endeavour to resolve by mu agreement any difficulties or doubts arising as to the interpretation or application of this Convention. They may also consult together for the elimination of double taxation in cases n provided for in the Convention.
- The competent authorities of the Contracting States may communicate with each othdirectly for the purpose of reaching an agreement in the sense of the preceding paragraphs.

Exchange of Information

- The competent authorities of the Contracting States shall exchange such information foreseeably relevant for carrying out the provisions of this Convention or to the administratio enforcement of domestic laws concerning taxes of every kind and description imposed on bel of the Contracting States, or of their political subdivisions or local authorities, insofar as the taxation thereunder is not contrary to the Convention. The exchange of information is not restricted by Articles 1 and 2.
- 2. Any information received under paragraph 1 by a Contracting State shall be treated a secret in the same manner as information obtained under the domestic laws of that State and s be disclosed only to persons or authorities (including courts and administrative bodies) conce with the assessment or collection of, the enforcement or prosecution in respect of, the determination of appeals in relation to, the taxes referred to in paragraph 1, or the oversight of above. Such persons or authorities shall use the information only for such purposes. They make disclose the information in public court proceedings or in judicial decisions. Notwithstanding foregoing, information received by a Contracting State may be used for other purposes when information may be used for such other purposes under the laws of both States and the competant of the supplying State authorises such use.
- 3. In no case shall the provisions of paragraphs 1 and 2 be construed so as to impose on Contracting State the obligation:
 - a) to carry out administrative measures at variance with the laws and administrative pra of that or of the other Contracting State;
 - to supply information which is not obtainable under the laws or in the normal course the administration of that or of the other Contracting State;
 - to supply information which would disclose any trade, business, industrial, commerc professional secret or trade process, or information the disclosure of which would be contrary to public policy (ordre public).
- A If information is requested by a Contracting State in accordance with this Article, the

5. In no case shall the provisions of paragraph 3 be construed to permit a Contracting S to decline to supply information solely because the information is held by a bank, other financinstitution, nominee or person acting in an agency or a fiduciary capacity or because it relates ownership interests in a person.

ARTICLE 26

Assistance in the Collection of Taxes

- The Contracting States shall lend assistance to each other in the collection of revenue claims. This assistance is not restricted by Articles 1 and 2. The competent authorities of the Contracting States may by mutual agreement settle the mode of application of this Article.
- 2. The term "revenue claim" as used in this Article means an amount owed in respect of taxes of every kind and description imposed on behalf of the Contracting States, or of their political subdivisions or local authorities, insofar as the taxation thereunder is not contrary to Convention or any other instrument to which the Contracting States are parties, as well as into administrative penalties and costs of collection or conservancy related to such amount.
- 3. When a revenue claim of a Contracting State is enforceable under the laws of that State and is owed by a person who, at that time, cannot, under the laws of that State, prevent its collection, that revenue claim shall, at the request of the competent authority of that State, be accepted for purposes of collection by the competent authority of the other Contracting State. That revenue claim shall be collected by that other State in accordance with the provisions of laws applicable to the enforcement and collection of its own taxes as if the revenue claim wer revenue claim of that other State.
- 4. When a revenue claim of a Contracting State is a claim in respect of which that State under its law, take measures of conservancy with a view to ensure its collection, that revenue claim shall, at the request of the competent authority of that State, be accepted for purposes o taking measures of conservancy by the competent authority of the other Contracting State. To other State shall take measures of conservancy in respect of that revenue claim in accordance the provisions of its laws as if the revenue claim were a revenue claim of that other State even at the time when such measures are applied, the revenue claim is not enforceable in the first-mentioned State or is owed by a person who has a right to prevent its collection.
- 5. Notwithstanding the provisions of paragraphs 3 and 4, a revenue claim accepted by a Contracting State for purposes of paragraph 3 or 4 shall not, in that State, be subject to the tin limits or accorded any priority applicable to a revenue claim under the laws of that State by re of its nature as such. In addition, a revenue claim accepted by a Contracting State for the pur of paragraph 3 or 4 shall not, in that State, have any priority applicable to that revenue claim the laws of the other Contracting State.
- Proceedings with respect to the existence, validity or the amount of a revenue claim of Contracting State shall not be brought before the courts or administrative bodies of the other Contracting State.
- 7. Where, at any time after a request has been made by a Contracting State under paragraph or 4 and before the other Contracting State has collected and remitted the relevant revenue of the first-mentioned State, the relevant revenue claim ceases to be:

- a) in the case of a request under paragraph 3, a revenue claim of the first-mentioned Sta that is enforceable under the laws of that State and is owed by a person who, at that to cannot, under the laws of that State, prevent its collection, or
- in the case of a request under paragraph 4, a revenue claim of the first-mentioned Sta respect of which that State may, under its laws, take measures of conservancy with a to ensure its collection,

the competent authority of the first-mentioned State shall promptly notify the competent authority of the other State of that fact and, at the option of the other State, the first-mentioned State shall either suspend or withdraw its request.

- 8. In no case shall the provisions of this Article be construed so as to impose on a Contracting State the obligation:
 - to carry out administrative measures at variance with the laws and administrative pra of that or of the other Contracting State;
 - b) to carry out measures which would be contrary to public policy (ordre public);
 - to provide assistance if the other Contracting State has not pursued all reasonable measures of collection or conservancy, as the case may be, available under its laws o administrative practice;
 - d) to provide assistance in those cases where the administrative burden for that State is clearly disproportionate to the benefit to be derived by the other Contracting State;
 - to provide assistance if that State considers that the taxes with respect to which assist is requested are imposed contrary to generally accepted taxation principles.

ARTICLE 27

Members of Diplomatic Missions and Consular Posts

Nothing in this Convention shall affect the fiscal privileges of members of diplomatic missic consular posts under the general rules of international law or under the provisions of spagreements.

ARTICLE 28

Entry into Force

- Each of the Contracting States shall notify the other, through diplomatic channels, of completion of the procedures required by its law for the bringing into force of this Convention This Convention shall enter into force on the date of the later of these notifications and shall thereupon have effect:
 - a) in Senegal:

- in respect of income tax and capital gains tax, for any year of assessment beginning on or after 6th April next following the date on which this Convention enters into force:
- in respect of corporation tax, for any financial year beginning on or afte
 April next following the date on which this Convention enters into force
- Notwithstanding the provisions of paragraph 1, the provisions of Article 24 (Mutual
 agreement procedure), Article 25 (Exchange of information) and Article 26 (Assistance in the
 collection of taxes) shall have effect from the date of entry into force of this Convention, with
 regard to the taxable period to which the matter relates.

Termination

This Convention shall remain in force until terminated by one of the Contracting States. It Contracting State may terminate this Convention, through diplomatic channels, by giving not termination at least six months before the end of any calendar year beginning after the exp five years from the date of entry into force of this Convention. In such event, this Convention shall cease to have effect:

- a) in Senegal:
 - in respect of tax withheld at source on income received on or after 1st January of the calendar year following the year in which the notice of termination is given;
 - in respect of other taxes, for taxable years beginning on or after 1st January of the calendar year following the year in which the notice of termination given; and
- in the United Kingdom:
 - in respect of income tax and capital gains tax, for any year of assessment beginning on or after 6th April next following the date on which the not termination is given;
 - in respect of corporation tax, for any financial year beginning on or afte April next following the date on which the notice of termination is given

EXPLANATORY NOTE

(This note is not part of the Order)

The Schedule to this Order contains a Convention ("the Arrangements") between the Government of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland and the Government of the Republic of Senegal dealing with the avoidance of double taxation and the prevention of fiscal evasion. This Order brings the Arrangements into effect.

The Arrangements aim to eliminate the double taxation of income and gains arising in one country and paid to residents of the other country. This is done by allocating the taxing rights that each country has under its domestic law over the same income and gains, and/or by providing relief from double taxation. There are also specific measures which combat discriminatory tax treatment and provide for assistance in international tax enforcement.

Article 1 provides for citation.

Article 2 makes a declaration as to the effect and content of the Arrangements.

The Arrangements will enter into force on the date of the later of the notifications by each country of the completion of its legislative procedures. They will take effect as follows:

- (a) in the Republic of Senegal:
 - (i) in respect of taxes withheld at source, on income received on or after 1st January next following the date of entry into force;
 - (ii) in respect of other taxes, for taxable years beginning on or after 1st January next following the date of entry into force;
- (b) in the United Kingdom:
 - (i) in respect of income tax and capital gains tax, for any year of assessment beginning on or after 6th April next following the date of entry into force; and
 - (ii) in respect of corporation tax, for any financial year beginning on or after 1st April next following the date of entry into force.

The date of entry into force will, in due course, be published in the *London*, *Edinburgh* and *Belfast Gazettes*.

A Tax Information and Impact Note has not been produced for this Order as it gives effect to a previously announced policy to enact a double taxation agreement.
