# CONVENTION FOR THE ESTABLISEMEN'T OH' A PARCEL POST SERVICE BETWEEN IHE UNI'ED_STATES AND HONG KONG. 

Signed at Washington, November 21, 1.903.

For the purpose of making better postal arrangements letween Hong Kong and the United States of America, the Undersigned, Arthur Stewart Raikes, His Britamic Majesty's Chargé d'Affaires, and Henry C. L'iyne, Postmaster-General of the United States of America, loy virtue of authority vested in them, have agreed upon the following Articles for the establishment of a Parcels-l'ost system of exchanges between Hong Kong and the United States:-

## ARTICLE I.

The provisions of this Convention relate only to parcels of mail matiter to be exchanged by the system herein provided for, and do not affect the arrangements now existing under the Universal Postal Union Convention, which will continue as heretofore; and all the Agreements hereinafter contained apply exclusively to mails exchanged under these Articles.

## ARTICLE II.

1. There shall be adnitted to the mails exchanged moder this Convention, articles of merchandize and mail matter-except letters, post-cards, and written matter-of all kinds, that are admitted under any conditions to the domestic mails of the comntry of origin, except that no packet maty exceed four pounds six ounces (or two kilograms) in weight, nor the following dimensions: Greatest lengeth in any direction, three feet six inches; greatest length and ginth combined, six feet; and musti be so wrapped or enclosed as to permit their contents to be easily examined by postmasters and customs ofticers; and except that the following artieles are prohibited admission to the mails exchanged under this Con-vention:-

Publications which violate the copyright laws of the country of destination ; poisons, and explosive or inflammalle substances; fatty substances, liquids, and those which easily liquefy ; conlections and pastes: live or dead animals, excejet dead insects and reptiles when thoroughly dried: fruits and vegetables which easily decompuse, and substances which exhale a bad odour; lottery tickets,
lottery advertisments, or lotery circulars; all obscene or immoral articles; artieles which may in any way damage or destroy the mails, or injure the persons handling them.
2. All admissible articles of merchandize mailed in one country for the other, or received in one country from the other, shall lec free from any detention or inspection whatever, except such as is required for collection of customs duties; and shall be forwarded by the most speedy means to their clestination, being subject in their transmission to the laws and regulations of each country, respectively.

## ARTICLE III.

1. A letter or communication of the nature of personal correspondence must not accompany, be written on, or enclosed with any parcel.
2. If such be found, the letter will be placed in the mails if separable, and if the communication be inseparably attached, the whole package will be rejected. If, however, any such should inadvertently be forwarded, the country of destination will collect on the letter or letters double rates of postage according to the Universal Postal Union Convention.
3. No pareel may contain packages intended for delivery at an address other than that bonne by the pareel itself. If such enclosed packages be detected, they must be sent forward singly charged with new and distinct Pareels-Pust rates.

## ARTICLE IV.

1. The following rates of postage shall in all cases be dequired to be fully prepaid with postage stamps of the country of origin, vi\%.-
2. In Hong Kong, for a parcel not exceeding one pound in weight, thirty-five cents; and for each additional pound, or fraction of a pound, thirty-five cents.
3. In the United States, for a parcel not exceeding one pound in weight, twelve cents; and for each additional pound, or fraction of a pound, twelve cents.
4. The parcels shall be promptly delivered to andressees at the post offices of address in the country of destination, free of charge for postase ; but the country of destination may, att its option, levy and collect from the addressee for interior service and delivery. a chatge the amount of which is to be fixed according to its own regulations, hat which shatl in 10 catse exceed filteen cents in Hong Kong, or five eents in the United States, for each parcel, whatever its weight.

## ARTICLE V.

1. The sender will. at the time of mailing the package, receive a Certificate of Mailing from the Post Olfice where the package is mailed on a form like Form 1 amexed hereto.
2. The sender of a package may have the same registered in accordance with the regulations of the country of origin.
3. An acknowledgment of the delivery of a registered article shall be returned to the sender when requested; but either country may require of the sender prepayment of a fee therefor not exceeding fifteen cents in Hong Kong or five cents in the United States.
4. The addressees of registered articles shall be advised of the arrival of a package adrlessed to them, ly a notice from the Post Office at destination.

## ARTICLE VI.

1. The sender of each parcel shall make a Customs Declaration, pasted upon or attached to the package, upon a special Form provided for the purpose (see Form 2 ammexed hereto) giving a general description of the parcel, an acourate statement of its contents and value, date of mailing, and the sender's signature and place of residence, and place of adtress.
2. The parcels in question shall be subject in the country of destination to all customs duties and all customs regulations in force in that country for the protection of its customs revenues; and the customs duties properly chargeable thereon shall be collected on delivery, in accordance with the customs regulations of the country of destination; but neither semer nor addressee shall be subject to the payment of any charge for fines or penalties om account of failure to comply with any customs regulation.

## ArITICLE VII.

Each country shall retain to its own use the whole of the postages, registration and delivery fees it collects on said parcels; consequentily, this Convention will give rise to $n o$ separate accounts between the two countries.

## ARTICLE VIIT.

1. The parcels shall be considered as a component part of the mails exchanged direct hetween Hong Kong and the United States, to be dispatched to destination by the country of origin at its cost and by such means as it provides: but must be forwarded, at the option of the dispatching office, either in boxes prepared expressly for the purpose or in ordinary mail sacks, marked " I'arcels-Post," and securely sealed with wax, or otherwise, as may be mutually provided by regulations hereunder.
2. Each country shall promptly return empty to the dispatching office by next mail, all such bags and boxes.
3. Although articles admitted under this Convention will be transmitted as aforesaid between the exchange offices, they should [111]
be so carefully packed as to be safely transmitted in the open mails of either country, loth in going to the exchange office in the country of origin and to the ottice of address in the country of rlestination.
4. Each dispatch of a Parcels-Post mail must be accompanied by a descriptive list, in duplicate, of all the parcels sent, showing distinctly the list number of each parcel, the name of the sender, the name of the addressee with address of destination, and the declared contents and value; and must be enclosed in one of the lowes or sacks of such dispatch (sce Form 3 amexed hereto).

## ARTICLE IX.

Exchanges of mails under this Convention from any place in either country to any place in the other, shall he effected through the posit ofices of both countries already desiguated as exchange post ofilices, or through such others as may be hereafter agreed upon: under such regulations relative to the details of the exchange as may be mutnally determined to be easential to the security and expedition of the mails and the protection of the enstoms revennes.

## ARTTCLE X .

1. As soon as the mail shall have reached the office of destimation, that oftice shall cheek the eontents of the mil.
2. In the crent of the pareel bill mot having heon receiverl, a sulstitute shouk be at once prepared.
A. Any errors in the entries on the parcel lill which may be discovered, should, after verification by a second officer, be corrected and moted for report to the dispatching office on a form "Verjfication Certificate," which should be sent in a special envelope.
3. If a parel advised on the hill be mo received, after the non-receipt has been verified ly a sccond officer, the entry on the bill should be cancelled and the fact reported at once.
4. If a parcel be nbserved to be insufficiently prepaid, it must not be taxed with deficient postage, lut the circumstance must be reported on the verification certificate form.
5. Should a parcel be received in a damaged or imperfect condition, foll particulars should be reported on the same form.
6. If nu verification certificate or note of error be received, a paycel mail shall he considered as duly delivered, having heon found on examination correct in all respects.

## ARTTGLE XI.

1. If a parcel cannot be delivered as addressed, or is refused, it must he retmod without charge, directly to the dispatching oflice of exchange, at the expiration of thinty days from its receipt
at the oflice of destination; and the country of origin may collect from the semier for the return of the pareel, a sum equal to the postage wlen first mailed.
2. When the contents of a parcel which camot be delivered are liable to deterioration or cormption, they may be destroyed at once, if necessary, or if expedient, sold, without previous notice or judicial formality, for the benefil of the right person; the particulars of each sale being noticed hy one post office to the other.
3. An order for re-direction or re-forwarting must be accompanied hy the anome due for postage necessary for the return of the article to the office of origin, at the ordinary parcel rates.

## ALITHCLE XII.

The Post Office Department of either of whe contraciors combries will not be responsible for the loss or dimage of any pancel, and no indemnity can consequently be clained by the semeler or addressee in either country.

## ARIISCLE XII.

The Postmastor-Genemb of Hong Kong, and the PostmasterGeneral of the United States of America, shall have authority to jointly make such further regulations of order and detail as may be found necessary to carry out the present Convention from time to time; and may, by agreement, preseribe conditions for the almission to the mails of any of the articles prohibited by Article II of this Convention.

## ARTICLE XIV.

This Convention shall take effect and operations thereunder shall hegin on the first day of January, 1904, and shall continue in force matil terminated by mitual agrecment; but may be ammulled at the desire of either Dejartment, upon six months' previous notice given to the other.

Done in duplicate, and signed at Washington, the wenty-first day of November One thousimd nine hamdred and three.


The foregoing Parcels-Post Convention between Hong Kong and the United States of America has been nogotiated and concluded with my advice and consent, and is hereby approved and ratified.
