EXCHANGE OF NOTES BETWEEN THE GOVERNMENT OF THE UNITED KINGDOM OF GREAT BRITAIN AND NORTHERN IRELAND AND THE GOVERNMENT OF THE FEDERAL PEOPLE'S REPUBLIC OF YUGOSLAVIA CONCERNING THE RECIPROCAL ABOLISHMENT OF THE REQUIREMENT FOR THE PRESENTATION OF AIRCRAFT PASSENGER MANIFESTS

The Secretariat of State for Foreign Affairs presents its compliments to Her Britannic Majesty's Embassy and, with reference to the Embassy's Note No. 141 dated August 1, 1961 concerning the reciprocal abolishment of the requirement for the presentation of aircraft passenger manifests, on the instruction of its Government, has the honour to propose as follows:

- 1. Civil United Kingdom registered aircraft on flights to and from Yugoslavia are exempted from the requirement to present their aircraft passenger manifests to the Yugoslav competent authorities.
- 2. When in such a United Kingdom aircraft there are passengers transiting Yugoslavia who have expressed to the captain of the aircraft their wish to stay in Yugoslavia for a short time, but not longer than 72 hours (from landing to taking off), the captain shall make a list of the names of such passengers and present it to the Yugoslav authorities, who will promptly deliver necessary passes to such persons so that they may freely move through Yugoslavia in a time limit of 72 hours. Such passengers are not obliged to leave on board of the same aircraft.
- 3. Civil Yugoslav registered aircrafts on flight to and from the United Kingdom are exempted from the requirement to present their aircraft passenger manifests to the British competent authorities.

If the foregoing proposal is acceptable to Her Majesty's Government in the United Kingdom, the Secretariat of State suggests that the present Note and the Embassy's reply in similar terms should be regarded as constituting the Agreement reached between the two Governments in this matter.

The Secretariat of State for Foreign Affairs avails itself of this opportunity to renew to Her Britannic Majesty's Embassy the assurance of its high consideration.
