Your Excellency,

I have the honour to refer to the Agreement between the European Economic Community and the Kingdom of Norway signed in Brussels on 14 May 1973.⁽¹⁾ With reference to Annex A to Protocol 1 of that Agreement, Her Majesty's Government undertake to open, in each of the years from 1974 to 1983 inclusive, duty-free quotas for imports of paper products from Norway.

A quota will be established for each of the products or groups of products listed in Annex A. The quotas will represent the bulk of the trade in the products concerned and will be granted approximately evenly throughout the products covered. The quotas in any one year will not be lower than in the preceding year.

Her Majesty's Government will be prepared to consult with the Government of Norway before the quotas for each year are determined.

Her Majesty's Government are prepared to undertake in 1975, together with the Government of Norway, a general review of these arrangements, taking into account experience gathered as well as the market situation and outlook. In the review it will be their intention to relate the quotas to the growth of the United Kingdom market for the products in question.
