JUDG MENT

THE BAILIFF: We are satisfied that this infraction was not a deliberate ploy to instal people there who were not qualified. Miss Nicolle for the Attorney General has admitted that the defendant was fully co-operative, that she did not make an excess profit, there was not any profiteering; furthermore there is now a qualified person there. It is also accepted that the accused was under a genuine misapprehension as to what you can and cannot do, although it is fair to say that if a person is not sure, the proper way is to go and ask for advice of the Housing Department and I know that they will all receive

that advice.

Taking all into account we think we can make a modest reduction in the conclusions asked for but there must be a fine because the law has clearly been broken. But it is not one of the gravest cases we have had and for those reasons we reduce the fine to £1,000 or six months' imprisonment and £200 costs.
