JUDGMENT

DEPUTY BAILIFF: In respect of all four charges brought against you we are going to put you on probation for one year on each of those charges all concurrent with each other, so making a total of one year. The conditions of the Probation Order is that you will be of good behaviour throughout that time, which will certainly include paying

your Social Security contributions; you will accept financial counselling from your Probation Officer; and you will in addition live and work where directed by your Probation Officer.

We hope that the Probation Service will consider whether it would not be better that you would have permanent employment rather than try to be self-employed. We have in mind some secure job for instance with the Parks and Gardens Department of the States where you would be in secure employment and earn a proper fixed sum every week and could not depart from that work without good grounds that would satisfy the Probation Service. But that will be a matter between the Probation Officer and you.

As far as we are concerned you will live and work where the Probation Officer tells you and you will accept whatever counselling he gives you about the managing of your finances.
