DETAILS OF MITIGATION:

Freelance leisure consultant working over the years to a variety of United Kingdom and Jersey companies. Thought companies <u>might</u> have been paying for him, but admitted burying his head in the sand. Ironically, offences only came to light when he was trying to comply with another aspect of the law by registering as an employer.

PREVIOUS CONVICTIONS:

Very dated speeding offence (discounted).

CONCLUSIONS:

£500 + £50 costs.

SENTENCE AND OBSERVATIONS OF THE COURT:

Conclusions adopted.

JUDGMENT

THE LIEUTENANT BAILIFF: The Court is satisfied with the conclusions of the Crown Advocate and they will be granted. As far as time to pay is concerned, we allow six months' grace.

On counts 1, 3, 5 and 7, you are fined the sum of £50 on each count, making a sub-total of £200. On counts 2, 4, 6 and 8, you are fined the sum of £75 on each count, making a sub-total of £300. In all £500 plus £50 costs, or in default three weeks on each count, consecutive, making a total of 24 weeks.
