

Environmental Information Regulations 2004 (EIR) Decision notice

Date: 2 November 2021

Decision (including any steps ordered)

- 1. The complainant requested information from London Borough of Redbridge ("the Council") about its response to concerns by residents about speeding traffic on Hollybush Hill. By the date of this notice the Council had not issued a substantive response to this request.
- 2. The Commissioner's decision is that the Council has breached regulation 5(2) of the EIR in that it failed to provide a valid response to the request within the statutory time frame of 20 working days.
- 3. The Commissioner requires the Council to take the following step to ensure compliance with the legislation.
 - The Council must provide a substantive response to the request in accordance with its obligations under the EIR.
- 4. The Council must take this step within 35 calendar days of the date of this decision notice. Failure to comply may result in the Commissioner making written certification of this fact to the High Court pursuant to section 54 of the Act and may be dealt with as a contempt of court.

Request and response



5. On 9 July 2021, the complainant wrote to the Council and requested information in the following terms:

"Several residents from Hollybush Hill, Wanstead have approached us to report longstanding problems with cars speeding along this road. They feel that these increase risks to road safety, with many 'near miss' incidents and a number of accidents at the corner of Hollybush Hill and the High Street. They tell us that these problems have been brought to the attention of council officers and local councillors over a period of years, but that no action has been taken.

Residents say that changes in traffic light sequences made problems much worse and these could be reversed. Changes to the left filter lane from by the Eagle pub to the High Street could also be reconsidered. Lorry and HGV traffic at night causes noise and disturbance to residents.

It may also be possible for some kind of traffic calming to be considered and, of course, enforcement of speed limits matters.

I would like to request information from you about:

Any reasons why representations from Hollybush Hill residents were not acted on and whether those reasons still apply.

What recent consideration – in the last two years – you have given to their representations?

Any assessment you have made of speeding on Hollybush Hill, based on data from ENPR cameras on the street.

It would also be helpful to know what discussions you have had with the Metropolitan Police over the last two years about lack of enforcement of speed limits in Wanstead and in Redbridge generally.

Please treat these requests according to Freedom of Information Act principles.

Finally, could you please tell me whether the council's policy (in the Third Local Implementation Plan) to introduce 20mph speed limits across residential streets in Redbridge is likely to have a bearing on the problems in Hollybush Hill in the near future."

- 6. The Council acknowledged the request on 20 July 2021.
- 7. To date, a substantive response to the request has not been issued.



Scope of the case

8. The complainant contacted the Commissioner on 27 September 2021 to complain about the Council's failure to respond to their request.

9. The Commissioner has considered whether the Council has complied with its obligations in relation to the time for compliance at regulation 5(2) of the EIR.

Reasons for decision

- 10. Regulation 5(1) of the EIR states that: "a public authority that holds environmental information shall make it available on request."
- 11. Regulation 5(2) of the EIR states that: "Information shall be made available under paragraph (1) as soon as possible and no later than 20 working days after the date of receipt of the request."
- 12. The Council did not provide a substantive response to the request within 20 working days of receipt. Therefore, the Commissioner's decision is that the Council has breached regulation 5(2) of the EIR.
- 13. On 12 October 2021 the Commissioner wrote to the Council, reminding it of its responsibilities and asking it to provide a substantive response to the complainant's request within 10 working days.
- 14. Despite this intervention the Council has failed to respond to the complainant.
- 15. From the evidence provided to the Commissioner in this case, it is clear that the Council did not deal with the request for information in accordance with the EIR. The Commissioner finds that the Council has breached regulation 5(2) by failing to respond to the request within 20 working days and it is now required to respond to the request in accordance with the EIR.



Right of appeal

16. Either party has the right to appeal against this decision notice to the First-tier Tribunal (Information Rights). Information about the appeals process may be obtained from:
