23	 D E C I S I O N

1 THE APPOINTED PERSON: The Community trade mark VALIMO was 2 registered under number 2119253 with effect from 7th March 3 2001. It was registered in the name of Valimo Wireless OY 4 for use in respect of various goods and services in 5 classes 9, 36, 38 and 42.

The goods specified in class 9 were as follows: 6 7 "Scientific, nautical, surveying, electric, photographic, 8 cinematographic, optical, weighing, measuring, signalling, 9 checking (supervision), life-saving and teaching apparatus 10 and instruments; apparatus for recording, transmission or 11 reproduction of sound or images; magnetic data carriers, 12 recording discs; automatic vending machines and mechanisms for coin-operated apparatus; cash registers, calculating 13 machines, data processing equipment and computers; fire-14 15 extinguishing apparatus."

16 The services specified in class 42 were as follows: 17 "Scientific and professional expert's services relating especially to communication and data processing, technical 18 and construction design; computer programming and rental of 19 computers and databases; scientific, industrial and 20 technical research, design and consultancy; consulting, 21 designing and renting of computers, ADP-equipment and 22 23 ADP-databases; designing, updating and rental of computer 24 software; leasing access time to databases; electronic 25 notary services."

1 On 21st October 2002 NEC Corporation applied to 2 register the designation VALMO as a trade mark for use in 3 relation to various goods and services in classes 9, 37 and 4 42. The goods specified in class 9 were as follows: 5 "Computers, electronic computers, mainframe computers, small business computers, personal computers, notebook computers, 6 7 supercomputers, computer workstations, scanners, computer 8 output printers, computer servers, disk storage, hard disk 9 drives, monitor displays, private branch exchanges (PBXs) 10 telephones, asynchronous transfer mode switches, 11 multiplexers, cellular phones, mobile phones, personal 12 digital assistants (PDAs) and facsimile machines; computer software; computer software for network management; 13 computer software for use in database management; computer 14 15 software for use in controlling the operation and execution of programs and network functions; computer software for use 16 17 in searching, retrieving, configurating, editing and formatting data information stored in computer servers 18 interconnected with local and global computer information 19 networks and for use in providing users/clients with the 20 edited data information via the aforesaid networks." 21

The services specified in class 42 were as follows: "Computer services; technical support services, namely, troubleshooting of computer hardware and computer software problems; computer software and hardware design for others;

integration of computer hardware and software systems for others; installation, updating and maintenance of computer software; computer programming for others; consulting services in the field of computer hardware and software; computer system analysis, troubleshooting of computer hardware problems."

7 The later application plainly conflicted with the 8 earlier registration. There were similarities between the 9 marks and also between the goods and services that would 10 obviously combine to give rise to a likelihood of confusion 11 if the marks were used concurrently in relation to goods and 12 services of the kind for which they were respectively 13 registered and proposed to be registered.

14 The later application for registration was accordingly 15 refused under section 5(2)(b) of the Trade Marks 1994 for the 16 reasons given in a decision issued by Mr. A.J. Pike on behalf 17 of the Registrar on 11th February 2004.

NEC Corporation gave notice of appeal to an Appointed 18 Person under section 76 of the Act. It was not disputed that 19 the goods and services in issue were either identical or 20 similar. In essence, it was contended that people in the 21 market for such goods and services would be on their guard 22 23 and likely to take extra care and be observant to a degree which made it relatively difficult to deceive or confuse 24 25 them.

1 On the strength of that proposition it was submitted 2 that the small difference between the marks VALIMO and VALMO 3 was sufficient to outweigh the visual, aural and structural 4 similarities between them and enable them to coexist in the 5 marketplace with no accompanying likelihood of confusion. 6 The conclusion of the argument was that the hearing officer's 7 decision was wrong and should be reversed.

8 I do not accept the premises or the conclusion of this 9 argument. Even though I am alert to the need to keep the two 10 marks separate in my mind when considering the submissions 11 made on behalf of the applicant for registration, I have 12 found myself frequently double-checking which of the two 13 marks I was looking at during the course of this hearing.

In my view the level of perspicacity and attention to detail required to keep these two marks separate in one's mind is far greater than the average consumer of the relevant goods and services would be likely to bring to bear on the subject in the conduct of their normal, everyday affairs. For those reasons shortly stated, this appeal will be dismissed.

There appear to be no cost implications involved in this decision: the Registrar did not attend and in ex parte proceedings there is usually no order for costs on appeal to this tribunal. That will be the position here.
