THE APPOINTED PERSON: I will now make some observations in relation to the Grounds of Appeal in this case. The starting point, in my view, has to be that the Hearing Officer decided in her decision issued under reference BL 0-281-16 on 8th June 2016, that there was a well-founded objection under section 5(1) of the Trade Marks Act 1994 based on the principle of the primacy of the earlier registered right afforded to the Opponent by United Kingdom Trade Mark No. 2621892.

Turning then to the Grounds of Appeal which have been discussed, in relation to the first ground the position, in my view, must be that the Registrar has no power to alter or dispense with the provisions of section 5 of the 1994 Act, still less to do so by administrative action to the detriment of the Opponent as proprietor of the earlier registered trade mark upon which it relies in the present proceedings. To put it another way, there is no room for an estoppel against the operation of a statutory provision such as section 5 on the grounds put forward by the Applicant in the circumstances of a case such as the present.

It is not the role or remit of the Registrar in adversarial proceedings to act of his own motion so as to intervene to prevent an applicant for registration from proceeding with its application for registration in the face of an objection to registration filed by an opponent in

circumstances such as these. Moving forward from there, the order for revocation of the Applicant's registered trade mark no. 2416552 on the ground of non-use has become final following the decision of the Appointed Person, Miss Emma Himsworth Q.C., delivered under reference BL O-420-15 on 14th July 2015. That matter is past and closed and it is not open to the Applicant to go behind that decision or mount a collateral challenge to it.

If it was thought that there was a legitimate basis available for invalidating the Opponent's earlier trade mark, proceedings would need to have been brought for that purpose.

None have been brought. I do not need to say anything as to what the position would, or might, be if any such proceedings were to be brought.

Drawing together those propositions, it is clear to me that the Grounds of Appeal disclose no viable basis for securing a reversal or setting aside on procedural grounds of the Hearing Officer's decision. It is therefore my view that the appeal should be dismissed and, on the short basis on which we have conducted this hearing today, that is now my decision.
