# **TRADE MARKS ACT 1994**

# **BACKGROUND AND PLEADINGS**

1. On 13 September 2021, Verde Apparel Ltd ("the applicant") applied to register the trade mark (series of two) shown on the cover page of this decision in the UK. The application was published for opposition purposes on the 15 October 2021. The applicant seeks registration for the following goods:

Class 25 Hoodies; T-shirts; Caps; Beanies; Jackets; Sweatshirts; Clothing.

2. The application was opposed by Verde Ltd ("the opponent") on 12 January 2022. The opposition is based upon section 5(2)(b) of the Trade Marks Act 1994 ("the Act"). The opponent relies upon the following trade mark:



# VERDE

International registration no. 1594148 International registration date 18 November 2020. Date of designation granted in UK 9 December 2021.

3. The opponent relies upon all of the goods for which the mark is registered, as set out in the Annex to this decision, which include various clothing and headwear goods in class 25.

4. The opponent claims that there is a likelihood of confusion because both parties' sell the same product and the applicant's trade mark is identical to theirs taking account of the role of the dominant elements in the overall impression of the marks.

5. The applicant filed a counterstatement denying the claims made.

6. The opponent is represented by Geromosxos Sakis and the applicant is unrepresented. A hearing was neither requested nor considered necessary, however, the applicant filed evidence in chief. I have taken all of the evidence and the parties' submissions into consideration in reaching my decision and will refer to it where necessary below.

7. Although the UK has left the EU, section 6(3)(a) of the European Union (Withdrawal) Act 2018 requires tribunals to apply EU-derived national law in accordance with EU law as it stood at the end of the transition period. The provisions of the Act relied on in these proceedings are derived from an EU Directive. This is why this decision continues to make reference to the trade mark case-law of EU courts.

# **EVIDENCE AND PRELIMINARY ISSUES**

8. The applicant's evidence consists of the witness statement of Christopher Lightfoot dated 22 August 2022. Mr Lightfoot is the Director of the applicant, a position which he has held since July 2021. Mr Lightfoot's statement was accompanied by 5 exhibits (Fig.1-5).

9. In his witness statement, Mr Lightfoot has made multiple points that I intend to address as a preliminary issue.

10. Fig. 2 and 3 of the applicant's evidence refers to the different colour palettes, photography and imagery styles used by both parties'. Fig 4 and 5 shows the parties' Instagram and other social media imagery. Mr Lightfoot also states in his witness statement that Fig. 4 shows that "as of March 2022 Verde Ltd displayed the brand as 'verde bags and accessories', which has since changed to 'Design & fashion' [...] they do not currently sell any apparel, creating a distinct difference between the two brands. In difference to profile descriptions, the two Instagram social media pages are clearly distinguishable due to the strong difference in social media imagery and product focus (fig 5)".

11. Firstly, as the opponent's mark had not completed its registration process more than 5 years before the filing date of the application in issue, it is not subject the use

requirements under section 6A of the Act. The opponent is entitled to rely upon its full specification, and it is not required to demonstrate that it has marketed or sold its goods in the UK. I must make my assessment based upon the parties' goods as applied for/registered and, therefore, what is sold in practice will not be considered.

12. Secondly, my comparison must be of the marks as registered. Therefore, the above submissions about how the parties' marks are used in practice, or even how the parties' overall branding (colour palettes, photography style etc.) is different, does not assist the applicant.

# DECISION

13. Section 5(2)(b) reads as follows:

"5(2) A trade mark shall not be registered if because -

(a)...

(b) it is similar to an earlier trade mark and is to be registered for goods or services identical with or similar to those for which the earlier trade mark is protected

there exists a likelihood of confusion on the part of the public, which includes the likelihood of association with the earlier trade mark."

14. As highlighted above, the earlier mark had not completed its registration process more than five years before the relevant date (the filing date of the mark in issue). Accordingly, the use provisions at s.6A of the Act do not apply. The opponent may rely on all of the goods it has identified without demonstrating that it has used the mark.

# Section 5(2)(b) case law

15. The following principles are gleaned from the decisions of the EU courts in Sabel BV v Puma AG, Case C-251/95, Canon Kabushiki Kaisha v Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer

Inc, Case C-39/97, Lloyd Schuhfabrik Meyer & Co GmbH v Klijsen Handel B.V. Case C-342/97, Marca Mode CV v Adidas AG & Adidas Benelux BV, Case C-425/98, Matratzen Concord GmbH v OHIM, Case C-3/03, Medion AG v. Thomson Multimedia Sales Germany & Austria GmbH, Case C-120/04, Shaker di L. Laudato & C. Sas v OHIM, Case C-334/05P and Bimbo SA v OHIM, Case C-591/12P:

- (a) The likelihood of confusion must be appreciated globally, taking account of all relevant factors;
- (b) the matter must be judged through the eyes of the average consumer of the goods or services in question, who is deemed to be reasonably well informed and reasonably circumspect and observant, but who rarely has the chance to make direct comparisons between marks and must instead rely upon the imperfect picture of them he has kept in his mind, and whose attention varies according to the category of goods or services in question;
- (c) the average consumer normally perceives a mark as a whole and does not proceed to analyse its various details;
- (d) the visual, aural and conceptual similarities of the marks must normally be assessed by reference to the overall impressions created by the marks bearing in mind their distinctive and dominant components, but it is only when all other components of a complex mark are negligible that it is permissible to make the comparison solely on the basis of the dominant elements;
- (e) nevertheless, the overall impression conveyed to the public by a composite trade mark may be dominated by one or more of its components;
- (f) however, it is also possible that in a particular case an element corresponding to an earlier trade mark may retain an independent distinctive role in a composite mark, without necessarily constituting a dominant element of that mark;

- (g) a lesser degree of similarity between the goods or services may be offset by a great degree of similarity between the marks, and vice versa;
- (h) there is a greater likelihood of confusion where the earlier mark has a highly distinctive character, either per se or because of the use that has been made of it;
- (i) mere association, in the strict sense that the later mark brings the earlier mark to mind, is not sufficient;
- (j) the reputation of a mark does not give grounds for presuming a likelihood of confusion simply because of a likelihood of association in the strict sense;
- (k) if the association between the marks creates a risk that the public might believe that the respective goods or services come from the same or economically-linked undertakings, there is a likelihood of confusion.

# **Comparison of goods**

16. In *Gérard Meric v Office for Harmonisation in the Internal Market*, Case T- 133/05, the General Court ("GC") stated that:

"29. In addition, the goods can be considered as identical when the goods designated by the earlier mark are included in a more general category, designated by trade mark application (Case T-388/00 Institut for Lernsysterne v OHIM – Educational Services (ELS) [2002] ECR II-4301, paragraph 53) or where the goods designated by the trade mark application are included in a more general category designated by the earlier mark."

17. The opponent's "caps being headwear" are self-evidently identical to "caps" in the applicant's specification.

18. Although "hooded sweatshirts" in the applicant's specification is worded differently to the applicant's "hoodies", they are self-evidently identical goods.

19. The opponent's "short-sleeved t-shirts" and "printed t-shirts" falls within the applicant's broader category of "t-shirts". The goods are identical on the principle outlined in *Meric*.

20. I find that "beanies" in the applicant's specification would fall within the broader category of "fashion hats" in the opponent's specification. The goods are identical on the principle outlined in *Meric*.

21. The opponent's "sports jackets", "leather jackets", "long jackets", "fur jacket" and "casual jackets" falls within the broader category of "jackets" in the applicant's specification. The goods are identical on the principle outlined in *Meric*.

22. The opponent's "hooded sweatshirts" falls within the applicant's broader category of "sweatshirts" in the applicant's specification. The goods are identical on the principle outlined in *Meric*.

23. All of the opponent's class 25 goods, falls within the broader category of "clothing" in the applicant's specification. The goods are identical on the principle outlined in *Meric*.

# The average consumer and the nature of the purchasing act

24. As the case law above indicates, it is necessary for me to determine who the average consumer is for the respective parties' goods. I must then determine the manner in which the goods are likely to be selected by the average consumer. In *Hearst Holdings Inc, Fleischer Studios Inc v A.V.E.L.A. Inc, Poeticgem Limited, The Partnership (Trading) Limited, U Wear Limited, J Fox Limited*, [2014] EWHC 439 (Ch), Birss J described the average consumer in these terms:

"60. The trade mark questions have to be approached from the point of view of the presumed expectations of the average consumer who is reasonably well informed and reasonably circumspect. The parties were agreed that the relevant person is a legal construct and that the test is to be applied objectively by the court from the point of view of that constructed person. The words "average" denotes that the person is typical. The term "average" does not denote some form of numerical mean, mode or median."

25. The average consumer for the goods will be members of the general public. The cost of purchase is likely to vary, and the goods will be purchased relatively frequently. However, various factors are still likely to be taken into consideration during the purchasing process, such as materials used, cut, aesthetic appearance and durability. Consequently, I consider that a medium degree of attention will be paid by the average consumer when selecting the goods.

26. The goods are likely to be obtained by self-selection from the shelves of a clothing retail outlet, online or catalogue equivalent. This means that the mark will be seen and so the visual element of the mark will be the most significant: see *New Look Limited v OHIM*, Joined cases T-117/03 to T-119/03 and T-171/03, paragraph 50. Visual considerations are, therefore, likely to dominate the selection process. However, I do not discount that there will also be an aural component to the purchase, as advice may be sought from a sales assistant or representative.

# Comparison of the trade marks

27. It is clear from *Sabel BV v. Puma AG* (particularly paragraph 23) that the average consumer normally perceives a trade mark as a whole and does not proceed to analyse its various details. The same case also explains that the visual, aural and conceptual similarities of the trade marks must be assessed by reference to the overall impressions created by the trade marks, bearing in mind their distinctive and dominant components. The CJEU stated, at paragraph 34 of its judgment in Case C-591/12P, *Bimbo SA v OHIM*, that:

"... it is necessary to ascertain, in each individual case, the overall impression made on the target public by the sign for which registration is sought, by means of, inter alia, an analysis of the components of a sign and of their relative weight in the perception of the target public, and then, in the light of that overall

impression and all factors relevant to the circumstances of the case, to assess the likelihood of confusion."


28. It would be wrong, therefore, to artificially dissect the trade marks, although it is necessary to take into account the distinctive and dominant components of the marks and to give due weight to any other features which are not negligible and therefore contribute to the overall impressions created by the marks.

29. The respective trade marks are shown below:

30. The opponent's mark consists of two elements: one is the word VERDE, in a stylised typeface; presented above that word is a device which consists of 2 bold slanted lines, to the right, and two thinner lines, slanting to the left, overlapped. Given the tendency for reading from top to bottom (as well from left to right), the word "VERDE" may be regarded as the second element of the opponent's mark, but the word is also positioned centrally and is notably longer/larger than the device, occupying more of the mark. It is also readable as a word, which the device is not. The word VERDE is the dominant and distinctive element of the mark, and therefore plays a greater role in the overall impression, with the device, positioning and stylisation playing a lesser role.

31. In its witness statement, the applicant submits that "Verde Apparel Ltd's logo features a one-of-a-kind, customised sans-serif typeface with a geometric based detailed with wide kerning, geometric font structure, uniform stroke width, uniform width of characters and use of a circle". However, I am satisfied that the manner in which a significant proportion of average consumers will read the first word of the applicant's mark is "VERDE". Therefore, despite the stylisation, including the letter 'E' missing its middle horizontal line, which is replaced with a circle, I shall proceed on the basis that the majority of the average consumers will read the marks as "VERDE" with the strapline "ON THE VERGE OF IMPACTFUL CHANGE" underneath. The word VERDE is the biggest and most central part of the marks, presented prominently in black on white. The words "ON THE VERGE OF" are also in black, but in a very small typeface; the words "IMPACTFUL CHANGE" are less small, but despite being presented in green, several factors, in my view (as an average consumer) lessen the impact of those words: they are in a stylised handwritten typeface and in a shade of green that is guite pale, and the words run a little into the letters "D" and "E" above. A triangle device is presented on the left hand side of the first mark, and presented on top of all of the wording in the second mark. I consider that the word "VERDE" is the dominant and distinctive element of the marks, and therefore plays a greater role in the overall impression, with the device and stylisation playing a lesser role. I also consider that the six-word strapline, due to its reduced size and position, and its allusive nature (as discussed below), also plays a lesser role in the overall impression on the mark.



32. Visually, Mr Lightfoot submits the following in Fig. 1:

33. The marks coincide in the fact that they share the word VERDE, which is the biggest, dominant and distinctive element of all the marks. Case law emphasises that it would be wrong to artificially dissect the marks, since the average consumer normally perceives a trade mark as a whole and does not proceed to analysis it in various detail. I have noted the differences in stylisation (including the letter 'E' missing its middle horizontal line, and replaced with a circle), however, I have found that the stylisation is subordinate to the distinctiveness of the word itself. The devices have in common that they are composed of diagonal lines, but the devices are different from one another (and in the applicant's Mark 1, a different position). The applicant's mark also includes the strapline "ON THE VERGE OF IMPACTFUL CHANGE". These all act as visual points of difference. Taking the above into account, I consider that the marks are visually similar to at least a medium degree.

34. Aurally, the devices in the marks will not be verbalised. Therefore, I consider that the opponent's trade mark will be pronounced as VER-DEE. I consider that, if the applicant's marks were to be pronounced as a whole, they would be pronounced as VER-DEE ON THE VH-URGE OF IM-PACT-FULL CH-ANGE. However, I consider that it is unlikely that a significant proportion of average consumers would articulate the strapline in the applicant's marks. Therefore, I also consider that the applicant's marks are aurally identical. However, if the strapline were to be pronounced, it would serve to reduce the aural similarities between the marks, resulting in a lower degree of aural similarity between them.

35. Conceptually, I had no submissions from either party on the meaning of VERDE within their marks. The word VERDE has no meaning in English, however, for consumers who understand, or speak Spanish, they may identify that VERDE translates from Spanish to English as "green". However, I do not consider that a significant proportion of average consumers would know or recognise this meaning. In my view, VERDE will be viewed as an invented word which would be attributed no particular meaning, making it the dominant and distinctive element of all the marks.

36. I do not consider that the devices in any of the marks adds to the conceptual message conveyed. However, I note that the strapline "ON THE VERGE OF

IMPACTFUL CHANGE" differentiates the marks conceptually. In its counterstatement, the applicant highlights that it is an "ethical, sustainable clothing brand with the focus to reduce the environmental impact of the clothing industry on the planet". I consider that, as this mark is being used in relation to clothing goods, the strapline "ON THE VERGE OF IMPACTFUL CHANGE" will be interpreted as it is written; that the organisation is either on the verge of making a change or being instrumental in impactful change. I accept that "impactful change" may be understood by the average consumer as being in relation to the environment and as such. Therefore the strapline conveys that the applicant is a sustainable clothing brand, making it an allusive element. However, the six words will still be perceived as a strapline message more so than carrying the trade mark.

37. Regardless, as both marks share the VERDE element, I consider that the marks are conceptually similar to a medium degree.

# Distinctive character of the earlier trade mark

38. In *Lloyd Schuhfabrik Meyer & Co. GmbH v Klijsen Handel BV*, Case C-342/97 the CJEU stated that:

"22. In determining the distinctive character of a mark and, accordingly, in assessing whether it is highly distinctive, the national court must make an overall assessment of the greater or lesser capacity of the mark to identify the goods or services for which it has been registered as coming from a particular undertaking, and thus to distinguish those goods or services from those of other undertakings (see, to that effect, judgment of 4 May 1999 in Joined Cases C108/97 and C-109/97 Windsurfing Chiemsee v Huber and Attenberger [1999] ECR 1-2779, paragraph 49).

23. In making that assessment, account should be taken, in particular, of the inherent characteristics of the mark, including the fact that it does or does not contain an element descriptive of the goods or services for which it has been registered; the market share held by the mark; how intensive, geographically widespread and long-standing use of the mark has been; the amount invested

by the undertaking in promotion of the mark; the proportion of the relevant section of the public which, because of the mark, identifies the goods or services as originating from a particular undertaking; and statements from chambers of commerce and industry or other trade and professional associations (see Windsurfing Chiemsee, paragraph 51)."

39. Registered trade marks possess varying degrees of inherent distinctive character, ranging from the very low, because they are suggestive or allusive of a characteristic of the goods, to those with high inherent distinctive character, such as invented words which have no allusive qualities. The distinctiveness of a mark can be enhanced by virtue of the use that has been made of it, but this has not been claimed in the present case and the opponent has filed no evidence.

40. As highlighted above, the opponent's mark consists of the invented word, VERDE, which has no conceptual meaning. This is presented below a device which consists of 2 bold slanted lines, to the right, and two thinner lines, slanting to the left, overlapped. The mark is neither allusive nor descriptive of the opponent's clothing goods. Therefore, taking the above into account, I consider that the opponent's mark is inherently distinctive to a high degree.

#### Likelihood of confusion

41. Confusion can be direct or indirect. Direct confusion involves the average consumer mistaking one mark for the other, while indirect confusion is where the average consumer realises the marks are not the same but puts the similarity that exists between the marks and the goods down to the responsible undertakings being the same or related. There is no scientific formula to apply in determining whether there is a likelihood of confusion; rather, it is a global assessment where a number of factors need to be borne in mind. The first is the interdependency principle i.e. a lesser degree of similarity between the respective trade marks may be offset by a greater degree of similarity between the respective goods and vice versa. It is necessary for me to keep in mind the distinctive character of the earlier mark, the average consumer for the goods and the nature of the purchasing process. In doing so, I must be alive to the fact that the average consumer rarely has the opportunity to make direct

comparisons between trade marks and must instead rely upon the imperfect picture of them that he has retained in his mind.

42. The following factors must be considered to determine if a likelihood of confusion can be established:

- I have found the marks to be visually similar to at least a medium degree.
- I have found the marks to be aurally identical. However, if the strapline in the applicant's mark was to be pronounced, it would serve to reduce the aural similarities between the marks, resulting in a lower degree of aural similarity between them.
- I have found the marks to be conceptually similar to a medium degree.
- I have found the opponent's mark to be inherently distinctive to a high degree.
- I have identified the average consumer to be members of the general public who will select the goods primarily by visual means, although I do not discount an aural component.
- I have concluded that a medium degree of attention will be paid during the purchasing process for the goods.
- The parties' goods are identical.

43. Taking all of the above into account, and bearing in mind that the average consumer rarely has the chance to make direct comparisons between trade marks and, instead, must rely upon the imperfect picture of them retained in their mind, I find that there is direct confusion. This is particularly the case given the relatively high visual similarity (to at least a medium degree) between the marks and the predominantly visual purchasing process for clothing goods.<sup>1</sup> Even where aural considerations play a greater role, the aural identity/higher aural similarity between the marks will have the same result.

44. As established above, the marks share the dominant and distinctive element "VERDE". Therefore, I consider that the average consumer would easily overlook the devices in both the applicant's and the opponent's marks. I also consider that the

average consumer may overlook the allusive strapline in the applicant's marks. Given that the average consumer rarely has the opportunity to compare marks side-by-side and will instead encounter them in different settings at different times, to my mind, the closeness between the marks, and the nature of the goods' purchase will lead the average consumer to fall foul of the effects of imperfect recollection. In other words, consumers of the earlier mark, upon seeing the later mark displayed on identical goods, will erroneously believe that the mark is that of the opponent (or vice versa). Therefore, taking all of the above into account, I consider there to be a likelihood of direct confusion.

45. In the event that I am wrong in that regard, and for the sake of completeness, I will also assess if there is a likelihood of indirect confusion. Indirect confusion was described in the following terms by Iain Purvis Q.C. (as he was then), sitting as the Appointed Person, in *L.A. Sugar Limited v By Back Beat Inc*, Case BL-O/375/10:

"16. Although direct confusion and indirect confusion both involve mistakes on the part of the consumer, it is important to remember that these mistakes are very different in nature. Direct confusion involves no process of reasoning – it is a simple matter of mistaking one mark for another. Indirect confusion, on the other hand, only arises where the consumer has actually recognized that the later mark is different from the earlier mark. It therefore requires a mental process of some kind on the part of the consumer when he or she sees the later mark, which may be conscious or subconscious but, analysed in formal terms, is something along the following lines: "The later mark is different from the earlier mark, but also has something in common with it. Taking account of the common element in the context of the later mark as a whole, I conclude that it is another brand of the owner of the earlier mark."

46. I consider that the shared common use of the dominant and distinctive word, VERDE, in both marks will lead the average consumer to conclude that the marks originate from the same or economically linked undertakings. I consider that the average consumer will see the additional strapline in the applicant's mark, which alludes to it being a sustainable clothing brand, and the use of the different devices, as alternative marks being used by the same or economically linked undertakings,

perhaps being an updated version of the same mark, and therefore indicative of rebranding.

47. The applicant's mark may also be perceived as a sub-brand of the opponent's VERDE mark. The average consumer would see the addition of the strapline "ON THE VERGE OF IMPACTFUL CHANGE" and perceive it as an alternative mark for a sub-brand of VERDE, specifically focussed on its sustainable collection of clothing goods. The use of sub-brands and brand extensions is common in the clothing trade. The General Court stated, in *Zero Industry Sri v OHIM*, Case T-400/06, at paragraph 81:

" ... it is common in the clothing sector for the same mark to be configured in various ways according to the type of product which it designates, and second, it is also common for a single clothing manufacturer to use sub-brands (signs that derive from a principal mark and which share with it a common dominant element) in order to distinguish its various lines from one another."

48. Therefore, taking all of the above into account, I consider that the average consumer would believe that the opponent's and applicant's marks are alternative marks being used by the same or economically linked undertakings, being updated versions of the same marks (re-branding), and sub-brand marks. Therefore, I consider there to be a likelihood of indirect confusion.

# CONCLUSION

49. The opposition is successful in its entirety and the application is refused.

# COSTS

50. The opponent has been successful and is entitled to a contribution towards its costs, based upon the scale published in Tribunal Practice Notice 2/2016. In the circumstances, I award the opponent the sum of **£300** as a contribution towards the costs of the proceedings. The sum is calculated as follows:

51. I therefore order Verde Apparel Ltd to pay Verde Ltd the sum of £300. This sum is to be paid within 21 days of the expiry of the appeal period or, if there is an appeal, within 21 days of the conclusion of the appeal proceedings.
