#### JUDGMENT.

During the hearing I drew Counsel's attention to clause 17 of the agreement of the 1st day of January, 1906, with reference to arbitration 10 but both Counsel agreed and asked me to hear and determine the matter under Rule 590 of the local rules (O. 54-A r. 1 at page 1109 of the Annual Practice). In my opinion it can be so decided where both parties consent.

Although the question for my decision is stated by Mr. Adderley, to be:—

"Whether in view of the fact that NO ROYALTY WAS
"FIXED BY THE CROWN in the 1906 agreement upon merchantable trimmings referred to in paragraph 10 (c) of that agreement
and in view of the fact that the licensees (the Plaintiff) have now
been released by the Crown from the payment of any royalty 20
thereon, the licensees are bound to pay to the Assignors (the
Defendant) two dollars per one thousand feet on the pit props,
poles for utility wires, firewood, wood pulp, wood chips for mixing
with cement for building purposes produced from such merchantable trimmings?"

it is my opinion that the question should be framed to read as follows:—

"Notwithstanding the terms of the agreement of the 8th July, "1948, and the relief thereby granted and in view of the fact that "THE AMOUNT OF THE ROYALTY WAS NOT FIXED BY "THE CROWN in the agreement of the 1st January, 1906, on 30 "merchantable trimmings is the Defendant now entitled to demand and to receive from the Plaintiff the sum of two dollars per one thousand feet on pit props, poles for utility wires, firewood, wood pulp, wood chips for mixing with cement for building purposes produced from such merchantable trimmings?"

This must be the real question since paragraph 10 (c) of the agreement of the 1st January, 1906, states that there shall be a royalty payable.

Mr. Adderley for the Plaintiff, has argued that to-day there are no royalties payable to the Crown on these pit props, poles, etc., owing to the relief granted by the Crown by the terms of the release of the 8th July, 1948, 40 and he further argues that there were never any such royalties payable and consequently the clause in Exhibit J (the indenture of the 17th March, 1941) which reads: "And Whereas the Assignors (the Defendant) have "agreed with the Assignees (the Plaintiff) to assign and transfer to the "Assignees the sole and exclusive right of cutting down . . . upon payment "to the Assignors of the sum of two dollars in respect of every one thousand

"feet of timber or lumber cut from the said lands and on which royalties "are payable by the Assignors to the Crown" is of no effect at this time since there are to-day no royalties payable to the Crown on these pit props, etc., and so it must follow, Mr. Adderley argues, that the Defendant, the Assignors in that Indenture of the 17th March, 1941, is not entitled to receive two dollars per one thousand feet on these pit props, etc.

No. 3.

First there seems to me to be no question but that royalty is payable Judgment. on "other merchantable trimmings or products" obtained by the licensees continued. under the terms of the agreement of the 1st day of January, 1906.

10 Mr. Adderley bases his argument on what he submits is a fact, namely, that no royalty was in fact ever payable to the Crown because none was fixed. I am unable to agree with this because it is my opinion that royalty was "payable" to the Crown but that the amount was not fixed but to be fixed.

The meaning of the words: "the sum of two dollars...in respect of "every one thousand feet . . . and on which royalties are payable by the "Assignors to the Crown" is in my opinion such as to require that this sum be paid on timber and lumber cut which was subject to a royalty at the date of the making of the Indenture of the 17th March, 1941, 20 Exhibit J. It is part of the consideration for the assignment thereby made. The Defendant is, in my opinion, entitled to demand and receive payment from the Plaintiff of two dollars per one thousand feet on the pit props, etc.

The relief granted by the Crown to the Plaintiff cannot avoid payment due or to become due by the Plaintiff as between the Plaintiff and the Defendant and in my opinion the release by the Crown cannot be read so as to affect the consideration for the executing of a deed or an assignment —a grant—sometime prior to the release.

A release by the Crown from the payment of royalty to it cannot affect the previous agreement or its meaning.

The reference to "royalty" was in my opinion inserted in the docu-30 ments to define or describe on what products or things the sum of two dollars per one thousand feet should be paid.

Although this is an originating summons at the instance of the Plaintiff yet in effect each party is saying: "Here is an agreement. Will the Court say what this clause means?" I have given my opinion as to the meaning of the clause and in the circumstances each party will pay its own costs.

Summons for interpretation of a document.

Mr. Adderley

The Crown has owned acreage in Colony and it still does. There are 20 forests on Island of Grand Bahama pines etc. On 1st January, 1906 Crown made agreement with E. Hallenbeck and W. O'Brien, and these two men were given sole right to cut down, remove, manufacture and export timber then on Crown Land at Grand Bahama.

Extract rosin etc. for 10 years with right of renewal for a further period of 10 years to 100 years.

The Document is recorded in Book F.10, Page 461.

By various assignments (all approved by the Crown), the rights etc. which Crown gave on 1st January 1906 are now held by the Abaco Lumber Company Limited, under an assignment of 17th March 1941 between the 30 Defendants and Plaintiffs recorded in Book Q.16 pages 348 to 353.

## Re 1st January 1906 Agreement

Paragraph 9. Full return to be made . . . to determine amount of royalties due to Crown :—

Para. 10 Royalties payable . . . at time rendering return

- 1. (A) Railway ties \$2.00 per 1000.
  - (B) All else 37½ cents etc.
- 2. Turpentine and resin.
- 3. Other merchantable trimmings . . . special royalty not exceeding
  - 1 (B) above to be arranged with Surveyor General.

40

Operations were carried on under 1906 licence and royalties were paid under 10 (A). These were at Grand Bahama.

Lumber only was then produced and ties for Company's own use.  $37\frac{1}{2}$  cents therefore paid by the licensee to Crown on every 1000 ft.

## Re 1941 assignment:

Defendants assigned their rights under the original licence to Plaintiffs and recited as indicated at X in the Assignment.

"On payment of \$2.00 . . . lumber cut and saleable and on which royalties are payable."

"and that the assignee . . . # marked on the Assignment.

Therefore the Abaco Lumber Company agreed to pay to Crown all 10 royalties due in respect of lumber cut—

"and it is hereby . . . shall continue . . . " to  $\boldsymbol{\Phi}$  marked on the Assignment.

Apart from actual . . . board lumber produced no other saleable products were produced by Plaintiffs nor by any other licensee from 1906 therefore the question of royalties for 40 years related to actual cut board lumber.

## Re Licence of 1st January 1906

Par. 10 Royalties were payable.

Plaintiffs now are considering expansion of work at Grand Bahama. 20 With modern knowledge etc. can they produce from pine lands "merchantable trimmings"? example—poles—pit props, fire wood—wood pulp, chips for cement—purposes not involving sawing timber into lumber and approved by Crown.

No production of "merchantable trimmings" up to date. Plaintiffs made representations to Crown with reference to the production of merchantable trimmings for commercial purposes which would involve the use of hearts of pine trees which are now wasted and thrown on ground—and which would involve the use of pine trees of 6 inches and slightly over and 3 feet from ground (see par. 18 of 1906 Agreement).

30 The representation covers portions not economically convertible into lumber.

Crown (in 1906 agreement) gave consideration to representations and by agreement of 8th July 1948 the Crown released Plaintiffs, who under Assignment 1941 agreed to pay royalties, from payment of any and all royalties under 10 (c) of 1906 agreement for 30 years.

After the release of 1948 Plaintiffs felt and were advised to get an interpretation by Crown:

"As to whether in view of terms of 8th July 1948 agreement the "Defendants are entitled to \$2. per 1000 feet re" chips for cement,—40 purposes not involving sawing timber into "lumber" in respect of which no royalty has been paid, but which are saleable.

Bahamas Practice Rule 590 and O. 54A Rule 1. (Annual Practice p. 1109.)

Affidavit of F. Weech, sworn 26th July 1948 and filed.

"No royalty" . . . to end.

Re 1906 Agreement. Pars: 9, 10.

Re 9.

Check may be made by Crown.

Re 10.

Royalties payable every half-year.

" Payable" Cf. Burns Law Dictionary p. 655.

"A sum of money is payable when a person is under an obligation to pay. It may therefore signify an obligation to pay in future but when used without qualification means that debt is payable at once as opposed to owing."

Par. 10 says when royalties are payable.

Under 1941 Assignment to produce 1,500,000 feet lumber.

Under 1941 Assignment at X " and on which."

1906 Agreement tells the time when royalties are payable.

Paras. 9 and 10 (c) have been carried out.

10 (c) no royalty was ever fixed—no production undertaken and so no return made, and none could have been made except for actual lumber now produced.

Therefore how can one construe it so that the Defendants collect \$2.00 on merchantable products when according to par. 9 payment of 20 royalty is based upon—

- (1) fixing royalties under 10 (c) and never done, waived for 30 years and
- (2) only payable after full and correct return of quantities has been made at the end of half-year when royalties would be payable.

It is impossible to determine amount of time except by referring to 9 and 10.

If no objection to make half-yearly return and no necessity for Crown to check returns and if no royalty fixed and waived—how can Defendants 30 argue that they are entitled to \$2. per 1,000 feet on merchantable trimmings and on which royalties are payable?

How can Defendants claim under 9 and 10?

Re "payable," in ordinary sense it is an obligation. If Abaco Lumber Company Limited in fact dispose of merchantable trimmings, if Abaco Lumber Company Limited on demand refused to pay Bahamas Cuban Company Limited anything for merchantable trimmings, how could Bahamas Cuban Company Limited found a claim against the Abaco Lumber Company Limited when under this agreement there are these words "and on which royalties are payable to Crown." Is there an 40 obligation to pay royalties on merchantable trimmings to the Crown under 1906 for 30 years?

See pars. 9 and 10 of 1906 agreement.

What could the Defendants establish under 1906 pars. 9 and 10?

No obligation to make return of merchantable products and no royalties payable under par. 10 and never have been, unless paras. 9 and 10 are complied with.

So long as Crown collects royalties and pars. 9 and 10 are complied with, it may be said that Defendants have right to collect \$2 per 1,000 feet Chief according to return. But if the Crown has no right there is no obligation Notes of on the part of the Plaintiffs. During next 30 years no royalties are payable Submissions to Crown on merchantable trimmings in accordance with pars. 9 and 10 of Counsel. and under the waiver of 1948.

Smith v. Lucus 45 Law Times. 460 Jessel, etc. at page 462 "It is not permissible . . . express intention." But see the Agreement of 1941. In 1941 the only royalties payable to Crown were these on lumber on which 37½ cents per 1,000 feet were paid to Crown and \$2 per 1,000 feet to Defendants.

(In 1941 nothing was payable under pars. 9 and 10 re merchantable trimmings.)

Principle to be followed in interpretation:—

20 It is conceded that words of a written instrument must be taken in the ordinary plain sense of the words.

> You must construe according to the literal import, unless there is something in context showing what must be the meaning of the words.

How can one argue that, when Bahamas Cuban Company in agreement with Abaco Lumber Company Limited assigned their right for payment of \$2 per 1,000 feet on timber or lumber cut . . . and on which royalties are payable under licence. Bahamas Cuban Company Limited could now establish right to claim \$2 per 1,000 feet on "merchantable trimmings," 30 when no royalties have been payable under 9 and 10 on merchantable trimmings when the position is put beyond doubt by waiver of 1948 by the Crown. On behalf of the Abaco Lumber Company I submit the interpretation as set out in the Originating Summons that they are not entitled to construction that Defendants are entitled to \$2 per 1,000 feet on merchantable trimmings, since no royalties payable to Crown and never were.

Mr. G. Higgs:

Action is to construe Exhibit J and declare the rights of the parties under it.

There is only one question namely: What is meant by the words in the recital to Exhibit J at X in the document: "on which royalties "are payable by the Assignor to Crown under Assignor's Licence".

Plaintiffs say: Substitute words "on which royalties may be payable "by Assignees to Crown".

While accepting Mr. Adderley's illustration of the principle, Mr. Higgs referred to :

Norton on Deeds, 2nd Edition pages 50, 52, 53

"To interpret a deed . . . discovered ".

"The word intention . . . employed ".

Here it is the meaning of the words employed.

Gray and Pearson 10 E.R. p. 1216.

At p. 1223. "Supposing . . . to adhere . . . meaning . . . instrument".

P. 1234. "I have been long . . . but no further".

Monypenny v. Monypenny 11 E.R. 671.

P. 684. "But in every case . . . conclusion".

Court is to consider words used and expressed in Exhibit J.

### Admitted facts:

By Exhibit A Crown to Hallenbeck and O'Brien gave the right to fell all timber above a certain size on payment of royalties to Crown of varying amounts on all merchantable, that is <u>saleable</u>, products <u>derived</u> therefrom.

For royalties of  $37\frac{1}{2}$  cents for 1000 feet the licensees could cut down and remove all timber.

That licence was assigned by Exhibit B and Exhibit F.

So that on 14 October 1920 the Defendants were absolutely entitled to this valuable concession.

By Exhibit J of the 17 March 1941 Defendants entered into an agreement with Plaintiffs. Note Exhibit J is different from the Assignment of previous licences.

Cf. Exhibit B. For a stated sum Hallenbeck and O'Brien granted etc. to Bahamas Timber Company Limited certain licences to cut etc. in Exhibit A to hold to Bahamas Timber Company Limited forever.

Cf. Exhibit F. It is almost the same as "B" except for consideration.

Cf. Exhibit J. This is not an assignment of licence.

Exhibit J is a sub-licence from Defendants to Plaintiffs.

There is no covenant to pay anything for the rights, but, by implication of Counsel the Plaintiffs in effect promised to pay Defendants \$2 per 1000 feet of continued. timber cut which is saleable and on which royalties are payable by the Assignors (Defendants) to Crown under assignors' licence.

No. 8. Chief Justice's Notes of Submissions of Counsel, continued.

Plaintiffs stress "payable" (see pars. 9 and 10 of Exhibit A), and say that because royalties were payable under Exhibit A at a certain 10 time and under certain circumstances which had not happened before the assignment by the Defendants to the Plaintiffs, therefore such royalties were never payable at all by the Defendants.

But if we refer to Exhibit A, "payable" is definitely qualified, because par. 10 says "following . . . shall be payable in accordance . . . return".

There is a definite obligation to pay royalties under 10, though the time might have been postponed.

Assume A holds a lease for 10 years with 5 years to run.

A assigns to B. A takes covenant from B to indemnify A against 20 the rent payable under A's lease.

Then, if Adderley is correct covenant is useless, because at the time for payment of rent for remaining 5 years has not yet arrived, then no rent is payable by A.

Re controversial words in J.

It is clear that the words are descriptive only.

They are put in to indicate on what timber Plaintiffs should pay stumpage of \$2 per 1000 feet.

Some words had to be put or the Plaintiffs would have to pay stumpage to Defendants on all timber whether saleable or not. Under 30 "A," Defendants only paid royalties on merchantable or saleable timber, and therefore it is obvious for parties to "J" to agree that Plaintiffs should pay Defendants set price on timber on which Defendants would have paid a royalty to Crown that is saleable timber. Therefore it is not only what is intended but what they mean namely royalties payable by Defendants to Crown under Exhibit A.

The very products on which Plaintiffs trying avoid paying for to Defendants are both saleable and they do carry a royalty by the Defendants under the original licence. See Exhibit L. Clause 1:

"For so long . . . no royalty shall be payable . . . trimmings."

40 The Crown releases them from royalties payable under  $\Lambda$ , and from products merchantable or saleable.

Consider the position prior to Exhibit L.

The Defendants who held a prize concession from the Crown had assigned to Plaintiffs (not licence) their rights under that licence in veturn for \$2 per 1,000 feet.

Then Plaintiffs go to Crown and represent:

(A) that business is not being operated economically and

(B) with help from Crown they could increase production of lumber and so offer large employment.

They asked to be relieved from payment of royalties under Exhibit A Submissions on (i) lop top etc. and (ii) from payment of royalties on other merchantable products obtained by using whole trees in rounded form which the Plaintiffs determine were not economic for production of lumber.

By L. Crown accorded to Plaintiffs' request.

See L. Bahamas Cuban Company never assigned the licence but sub-let it to Abaco Lumber Company. Without any knowledge on part of Bahamas Cuban Company the Crown entered into an agreement with 10 Plaintiffs, relieving them of payment of royalties under A. So to-day the Defendants must still pay Crown royalties.

There should have been a tri-partite agreement.

So, the Plaintiffs gained concession from Crown without Defendants' knowledge, and now come and ask Crown to interpret their agreement with Defendants Exhibit E and K that, in addition to having been released part of royalties they might also—p. 32—be relieved of paying Defendants any money for most valuable rights which Defendants assigned to Plaintiffs.

Plaintiffs are trying to take concession from Defendants for nothing.

This Action is gamble. All to gain and nothing to lose.

20

No such erroneous construction should be placed, because it would then be saving that they held another licence from the Court to write their agreement with Defendants.

- If Plaintiffs' argument is followed then they could get further exemption from Crown from payment of royalties and refuse to pay the Defendants anything at all for rights.
- Cf. Exhibit L the Plaintiffs have already gained extraordinary concessions from Crown, because they were relieved from royalties on lop, top, etc., and from royalties on trees themselves. See par. 1 Plaintiffs may say that the trees over 6 inches in diameter are not economic for 30 production of lumber, and so royalties are not payable, and as no stumpage, therefore Defendants get nothing.

Plaintiffs will say: We have agreed to produce per annum 3,000,000 feet of lumber and cannot use them as Higgs suggests—

But see par. 4 of Exhibit L "provided . . . Bahamas."

Therefore why can't they go to Crown and say, we cannot operate economically, and if you don't give further concessions we will close down and put labour out of work.

An Act has just been passed to establish Camp at Grand Bahama.

This will almost rival Nassau as a tourist resort.

40

Then the Plaintiffs could utilise timber in rounded form to get rid of this type of product to Butlin.

It would then be possible for the Plaintiffs to get further concessions so pay nothing at all for this concession to Defendants.

Words mean what they say, and we cannot assume they mean anything else, because business men do not give away rights thus, and Court should not interpret an agreement so as to destroy it.

Pugh and Duke of Leeds 98 E.R. 1323.

P. 1325: Mansfield: "This construction... to protect property... property... whatsoever. And although... benefit but here... parties."

P. 1329: "To conclude . . . effectual. That . . .

... deeds and not to destroy them ... meaning."

Parkhurst v. Smith 125 E.R. 1197.

P. 1200: "That too much regard...

... what was intention ...

... destroy it."

10 Court should place a construction to effectuate agreement and not destroy it.

"Assignors hereby assign and transfer to Assignees sole right of 
"cutting down . . . and exporting the said timber growing on the Crown 
"land . . . in respect of which the said licence has been granted to the 
"Assignors and of . . . timber. To hold . . . assigns etc." All privilege which they had under the original licence. Defendants even undertook 
to apply for renewal of original licence so long as the right to renew continued. Therefore as an absolute assignment is one by which the entire 
interest of the assignors of the chose in action is at least temporarily 
transferred unconditionally to the assignees and placed completely under 
his control.

To be absolute it is not necessary, however, that the assignment should take the form of an out and out transfer, which deprives the assignors for ever of all further interest in the subject-matter.

Cheshire and Fifoot 1st Edition, page 328.

Then this is an absolute assignment.

This was the extent of their licence under 1906.

Re Higgs. "That Plaintiffs are strangers to Crown."

But in 1941 agreement between Defendants and Plaintiffs

"And this Indenture also Witnesseth...that assignees (Plaintiffs) "agree...to Crown all royalties due Crown re any timber or lumber 40 "cut...land

"Further it is hereby mutually . . . that the said right to cut . . . "shall continue . . . purpose and no default . . . by the Assignee . . . two "dollars in respect of every 1000 feet . . . as aforesaid and . . . Crown."

Repeats obligation of assignees to pay to the Crown.

In Exhibit L (towards end): Now this Agreement also Witnesseth as follows:—

- (2) Crown hereby approved . . . 17 March 1941 from to

Therefore can Plaintiffs be strangers and have no right to deal with Crown?

Also Plaintiffs requested Crown to fix royalties for merchantable trimmings.

Re words in Exhibit L. "and on which royalties... being" were descriptive. It is submitted that when words as plain as these are written in legal documents they should be taken in simple meaning.

Bound by them. Therefore it is difficult to see a successful effort to take them from their ordinary meaning.

Smith v. Lucas (ante) 45 Law Times Report 462.

Since Higgs' case in 1741:

"The settlement . . . guess to be intention of the parties."

This later case (1881) than Higgs 1741.

Re depriving the Defendants of everything:

See Agreement 1941: Exhibit J. see par. in margin.

Therefore at the rate of payment minimum of £3000 per annum payable to Defendants by Plaintiffs, and so no question that if Plaintiffs gained in paying minimum of  $1\frac{1}{2}$  million feet of timber, they were out, and as Defendants would now have to stay there.

Further Exhibit L. Plaintiffs covenant to produce double  $1\frac{1}{2}$  million, and the more they produce the more the Defendants get.

Re Butlin interests. It is known that there are millions of poles (as pine trees) there.

Therefore never exhaust them for telephone poles.

Re further representation to Crown to waive 37½ cents.

In view of the fact that royalties fixed on timber since 1906 and paid and also as a condition in 1941, since then no reasonable construction could deprive Defendants of their income from lumber no matter what Crown did.

Court has a right to consider circumstances as they existed at a particular time.

See Canon v. Villiers 8 Ch. D. 415.

M.R. " in construing . . . entered into."

Royalties were fixed at  $37\frac{1}{2}$  cents.

Under 1906 Agreement Royalties fixed in 10 (a) and (b) and circumstances as known then, Crown did get royalties of  $37\frac{1}{2}$  cents and it is accepted by both parties that nothing was fixed re merchantable trimmings.

Nothing was payable in 1941 on merchantable trimmings.

Supreme Court of the Bahama Islands between the Petitioners Appellants and The Bahamas Cuban Company Limited Respondents setting forth (amongst other matters): that on the 27th July 1948 an originating summons was issued in the Supreme Court of the Bahama Islands (Equity side) on the application of the Petitioners for the determination of the question whether in view of an Agreement dated the 8th July 1948 (made between Sir William Lindsay Murphy K.C.M.G. acting on behalf of the Crown of the one part and the Petitioners of the other part) and upon the true construction of an Indenture of Assignment dated the 17th March 10 1941 (made between the Respondents of the one part and the Petitioners of the other part) the Respondents were entitled to the sum of two dollars United States currency on every one thousand feet in respect of the products specified in Clause 1 (i-vi) of the Agreement dated the 8th July 1948 cut from certain Crown Land referred to in an earlier Agreement dated the 1st January 1906 which were saleable but in respect of which the Petitioners paid no royalty to the Crown: that on the 11th November 1948 the Chief Justice of the Bahama Islands gave Judgment to the effect that the Respondents were entitled to the sum of two dollars United 20 States currency per thousand feet in respect of the said products and ordered that each party should pay their own costs: that on the 2nd December 1948 the Petitioners filed a notice of intention to appeal against the Judgment and served such notice on the Respondents: that Notice of Motion for leave to appeal to Your Majesty in Council was filed in the Registry of the Supreme Court on the 3rd December 1948 and served on the Respondents on the 6th December 1948: that the Notice of Motion was heard on the 7th December 1948 when the Respondents took the preliminary objection that it was out of time and the hearing was adjourned 30 for further argument of the preliminary objection: that on the 14th December 1948 the Chief Justice after hearing further argument upheld the preliminary objection and dismissed the Motion with costs: that the reasons given for his decision were that under the Rules made by Order in Council dated the 11th October 1912 applications for leave to appeal must be made within 21 days from the date of the Judgment to be appealed from and that the rules of the Bahama Practice giving the Supreme Court power to extend the time appointed for taking proceedings did not apply to Appeals from the Supreme Court to Your Majesty in Council and 40 that therefore he had no power to grant leave to appeal: And humbly praying Your Majesty in Council to grant the Petitioners special leave to appeal from the Judgment of the Supreme Court dated the 11th November 1948 and for further or other relief:

"THE LORDS OF THE COMMITTEE in obedience to His late Majesty's said Order in Council have taken the humble Petition into consideration and having heard Counsel in support thereof and in opposition thereto Their Lordships do this day agree humbly to report to Your Majesty as their opinion that leave ought to be granted to the Petitioners to enter and prosecute their Appeal 50 against the Judgment of the Supreme Court of the Bahama Islands dated the 11th day of November 1948 upon depositing in the Registry of the Privy Council the sum of £400 as security for costs:

"And Their Lordships do further report to Your Majesty that the proper officer of the said Supreme Court ought to be directed to transmit to the Registrar of the Privy Council without delay in Council an authenticated copy under seal of the Record proper to be laid before Your Majesty on the hearing of the Appeal upon payment special by the Petitioners of the usual fees for the same:

"And in case Your Majesty should be pleased to approve of appeal, this Report then Their Lordships do direct that there be paid in September any event by the Petitioners to the Respondents their costs of 1949, opposing the said Petition."

No. 9. Order of His Majesty granting leave to continued.

HIS MAJESTY having taken the said Report into consideration was pleased by and with the advice of His Privy Council to approve thereof and to order as it is hereby ordered that the same be punctually observed obeyed and carried into execution.

Whereof the Governor or Officer administering the Government of the Bahama Islands for the time being and all other persons whom it may concern are to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.

ARTICLES OF AGREEMENT made the first day of January in the year of Our Lord One thousand nine hundred and Six Between His Excellency Sir William Grey-Wilson Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Bahama Islands acting on behalf 10 of His Majesty the King his heirs and successors (hereinafter referred to as the "Licensors") of the one part and Elijah Hallenbeck and William O'BRIEN of Saint Paul Minnesota in the United States of America Lumber Merchants (hereinafter with their heirs executors administrators and assigns referred to as the "Licensees") of the other part.

It is hereby agreed as follows:—

- The Licensees shall have the sole right to cut down remove manufacture and export all pine timber growing on the vacant Crown Land at Grand Bahama and also to extract turpentine and rosin therefrom.
- 2. No hardwood shall be cut by the Licensees except in order to clear the way for roads and all hardwood so cut shall remain the property of the Crown.
- Subject to the right of renewal contained in Article 16 of this agreement the License hereby granted shall last for a period of Ten years computed from the date of this agreement.
- The Licensees in the exercise of the rights hereby granted may construct on Crown Land any roads tramways warehouses wharves or other works that the Surveyor General may certify to be necessary for the purposes of handling lumber free from the payment of rent or other 30 charges whatsoever. Provided that residences and buildings for housing labourers shall not be deemed works within the meaning of this article.
- The Licensees shall also have the right to acquire any lands belonging to the Crown which they may require for the erection of buildings for the accommodation of their servants and workmen at the price of \$4.00 per Acre or on lease at the rate of One shilling per acre per annum for the same period and on the same conditions as to renewal as the License hereby granted.
- The timber shall be worked in sections not exceeding 15000 acres to be laid out on the ground and numbered on a plan or identified 40 in such other convenient manner as shall be approved by the Surveyor General of the Colony (hereinafter referred to as the Surveyor General) and one month's notice shall be given to the Surveyor General of the intention of the Licensees to work any particular section whether for turpentine or for lumber.
- An account in such form as the Surveyor General may approve shall be kept by the Licensees showing the quantities of lumber turpentine rosin and other merchantable products respectively derived from each section and such account and all books kept in connection with the operations

of the Licensees shall be open at any time to the inspection of the Surveyor General or any one deputed on his behalf and the Licensees shall from time to time furnish for inspection such certificates invoices and documents as the Surveyor General may require.

- 8. The Surveyor General or anyone deputed on his behalf shall be His entitled to inspect at any time the actual operations of the Licensees under this License.
- 9. A full and correct return shall be made every Half-year to the Surveyor General showing the quantities of lumber turpentine rosin and Hallenber the Surveyor General or anyone deputed on his behalf shall be at liberty O'Brien, at all times to enter on the works that may be constructed by the Licensees lat and to take all such measures as he may deem necessary for checking the January accuracy of the return thus made.
  - 10. The following royalties shall be payable in accordance with and at the time of rendering the said return by the Licensees—
    - (A) In respect of all lumber in the form of railway-ties at the rate of \$5.00 per 1000 of such railway-ties, and on all other lumber at the rate of  $37\frac{1}{2}$  cents per \*100 superficial feet board \*sic measurement undressed.
    - (B) In respect of all turpentine and rosin at the rate of one cent per gallon for turpentine and ten cents per barrel not exceeding 500 lbs. in weight for rosin; but any turpentine and rosin royalty so paid shall be deducted from any lumber royalties ultimately payable in respect of the trees on which royalty has been paid under this Sub-Article.
    - (c) In respect of all other merchantable trimmings or products obtained by the Licensees under this License a special royalty not exceeding the royalty on lumber (the amount of which shall be arranged with the Surveyor General).
  - 11. The amount of royalty payable under this License shall in no year be less than \$250.00 (American Gold) whether or not any lumber be cut or any turpentine or rosin be extracted under this License.
  - 12. The turpentine shall be extracted by the Herty Cup System or by some other system approved of by the Surveyor General.
  - 13. The Licensors shall have the right at any time to cut and remove all such trees as may in the opinion of the Surveyor General be necessary for Public Works in the Colony.
- 14. The Licensors shall have the right at any time to sell or otherwise 40 dispose of any portion of the abovementioned land reserving however to the use of the Licensees so long as this License remains in force all such lands as are actually occupied by warehouses wharves or other works.

Provided However that if any such sale or disposition as aforesaid be made the Licensees shall be given the period of Twelve Months in which to remove all timber from the land so sold or disposed of in all cases in which the parcel of land so sold or disposed of exceeds Twenty Acres.

Provided Further that the Licensors shall not dispose of over Two Thousand Acres Per Annum (in addition to any lands acquired by the Licensees under Article 5 of this agreement) without the consent of the 50 Licensees.

- 15. Should the Licensees fail to observe and perform any of the conditions herein named in any material particular the Licensors shall forthwith have the right to determine this License and the same and all deposits made thereunder shall thereupon be forfeited to the Crown.
- 16. It is Lastly Agreed between the parties hereto that provided the Licensees shall in all material particulars have observed and performed during the aforesaid period of Ten years all of the conditions hereinbefore mentioned then and in such case they shall have the same rights and privileges for a Further period of Ten years.

And if during such second period of ten years they shall in like manner 10 have observed and performed such conditions they shall have a further extension of such rights and privileges for a Third period of ten years and in like manner up to the period of One Hundred Years.

Provided Always that the Licensors may withhold the renewal of so much of this agreement as relates to the right to extract turpentine and rosin at the expiration of the first period of ten years unless it is shewn to the satisfaction of the Surveyor General whose decision shall be final that the operation of extracting turpentine from the timber does not seriously impair the value of the trees or of the lumber to be derived therefrom.

- 17. If at any time hereafter any dispute difference or question shall arise between the Licensors and Licensees touching the construction meaning or effect of these presents or any clause or thing herein contained or the rights or liabilities of the Licensors and Licensees under this License or otherwise howsoever in relation to the premises then any such dispute difference or question shall be referred to the arbitration of two disinterested persons one to be appointed by the Licensors and one by the Licensees together with an umpire to be appointed by the arbitrators in writing and every such arbitration shall be conducted in the same manner and on the same conditions as an arbitration under the Arbitration Act 1889 30 as applied to the Colony by the Act of Assembly 62 Victoria chapter 20.
- 18. In the construction of this agreement unless the context otherwise requires "Vacant Crown Land" shall mean all land not already sold or leased by the Crown to private persons, "Timber" all growing pine trees of and exceeding six inches in diameter at a height of three feet from the base, "Railway Ties" a piece of timber six to twelve inches on face seven inches thick and not exceeding eight feet long.

and sale of timber in rounded form will be of great economic benefit to the Colony and will result in an increase in the amount of royalty payable to the Crown in respect of such lumber And Whereas the Crown being satisfied that the production and sale of timber in rounded form by the Licensees will enable the Licensees to substantially increase the production of lumber at the said Island of Grand Bahama thus resulting in an increased amount of royalty being payable to the Crown in respect of such lumber and will also establish the business of the Licensees at the said Island of Grand Bahama on a sounder economic basis and will provide large scale additional employment within the Colony which will be of great economic 10 benefit to the Colony the Crown has agreed that no royalty shall be payable by the Licensees in respect of the lop top and other merchantable trimmings from the pine trees at Grand Bahama sawn into lumber and on the pine trees of and exceeding six inches in diameter at a height of three feet from the base which the Licensees determine are not economic for the production of lumber and are used by the Licensees for the purpose of extracting saleable And Whereas the Licensees have timber in rounded form therefrom agreed to produce annually Three Million superficial feet board measurement undressed of lumber or such lesser quantity as may be agreed to in any year by the Crown and offer the same for sale within the Colony at a price 20 not exceeding the market price current from time to time for similar lumber if sold elsewhere by the Licensees which the Licensees have agreed to do providing timber from which such lumber can be produced economically is available on the said Island of Grand Bahama Now This Agreement Witnesseth as follows:—

- 1. For so long as the Licensees are the assignees of the said licence but not exceeding a period Thirty years from the date of these presents the Crown agrees that no royalty shall be payable by the Licensees on the lop top and other merchantable trimmings from the pine trees at Grand Bahama sawn into lumber and other merchantable products to be obtained 30 by the Licensees in utilizing pine trees of and exceeding six inches in diameter at a height of three feet from the base which the Licensees determine are not economic for the production of lumber for the following purposes only namely:—
  - (I) Pit-props;
  - (II) Poles for utility wires;
  - (III) Firewood;
  - (IV) Wood pulp;
  - (v) Wood chips for mixing with cement for building purposes; and
  - (VI) Any other purposes not involving the sawing of the timber in 40 rounded form thus obtained into lumber which are specified by the Licensees and approved of in writing by the Crown.
- 2. The Crown hereby approves of the said assignment of the Seventeenth day of March, A.D., 1941 from the Bahamas-Cuban Company. Limited to the Licensees.
- 3. The Crown hereby releases the Licensees from the obligations contained in paragraph 6 of the said licence.
- 4. For so long as the Licensees are the assignees of the said licence but not exceeding a period of Thirty years from the date of these presents

the Licensees agree to produce annually Three million superficial feet board measurement undressed of lumber (or such lesser quantity as may be agreed to in any year by the Crown) and to offer the same for sale Agreement, within the Colony at the market price current from time to time for His similar lumber if sold elsewhere by the Licensees providing timber from Excellency which such lumber can be produced economically is available on the said Sir William Island of Grand Bahama.

5. As herein varied the said licence shall continue in full force and and The effect and binding upon the Crown and the Licensees and their assigns.
