The Nigerian Farmers & Commercial Bank Ltd. (In Voluntary Liquidation):

In response to your request for information I have to report that I attended the creditors meeting held in connection with the voluntary liquidation of the above Bank at 2, Alli Street, Lagos, on Monday

29 December, 1952. I represented a number of overseas creditors who In the had forwarded Bills for collection by the above Bank through the Bank Supreme of British West Africa Limited. Their claims, which at that time, exceeded £15,000 are now in the region of £20,000 and it seems likely that this figure will increase as more claims are notified.

I wish to place on record my dissatisfaction at the manner in which Appexure the above mentioned meeting was conducted. The purpose for which "C" to such a meeting must be convened and the extent of the business which Affidavit such a meeting must be convened and the extent of the business which may be considered at the meeting are clearly laid down in Section 181 of Harland, 10 the Companies Ordinance. Briefly the meeting must appoint a Liquidator dated 23rd or Liquidators and if a Liquidator is appointed other than, or in addition January, to the Liquidator nominated by the Company, application must be made 1953to the Supreme Court to confirm the appointment. At the meeting the Liquidator Mr. Adebayo, having read Section 181 (1) and (2) to the assembly, completely ignored it and proceeded to suggest to the meeting that the Bank should be reconstructed. I do not propose to go into details concerning the harangues and counter-harangues, proposals and counterproposals, which occupied the better part of two hours, but at the end a "resolution" was written out appointing John Adebayo and Akintola 20 Williams to be Joint Liquidators and resolving that the Bank be reconstructed. I do not know if this resolution was signed by all the creditors present as I recorded in the book containing the resolution a protest on behalf of my client and left the meeting at the stage. Nor do I know at what stage the meeting agreed to a reconstruction as I cannot recall that a vote was taken.

As regards the vote taken on the appointment of the Liquidators I must hold this to be irregular. The vote was taken by a show of hands, no effort having been made to ascertain that all the persons voting were, in fact, creditors or for what sums. I pointed out this fact to Mr. Adebayo 30 before the vote was taken.

I have since seen in the Supreme Court List an application by the Liquidators, for leave to convene meetings with a view to a reconstruction. I have not yet seen an application for confirmation of the appointment of the Liquidators as required by Section 181 (2) of the Companies Ordinance, nor, so far, as I am aware, was a creditor appointed at the meeting to make such application as required by that Section. I cannot, therefore, understand on what authority the Liquidators make their application.

I am deeply disturbed at the manner in which the suggested 40 reconstruction was put before the meeting. No attempt was made to explain to the creditors, the majority of whom were presumably unfamiliar with such matters, the full implications of a reconstruction.

No facts or figures were produced to shew what was the then financial position of the Bank and I cannot see how a reconstruction can be considered, if at all, until all the information has been gathered and sifted. Nor was it explained, how if the Bank is unable to pay its creditors in full, funds can be found for reconstruction.

The petition of the Official Receiver in this matter first came before me on the 26th of January, 1953. At that time Mr. Thompson, Counsel for the Company in liquidation, who was appearing in another matter which concerned the affairs of the said Company, stated that he 30 did not know about the petition. The Court then adjourned both matters until the 27th of January, 1953 and stated, for reasons given, that on the said date the Official Receiver's Petition would be taken first.

On the 27th of January, 1953, Mr. Thompson Counsel both for the Company in voluntary liquidation and for Mr. John Adebayo the local liquidator of the said Company stated, in effect, that while he had been served with the petition as Counsel for the Company in liquidation he had not been served with it as Counsel for the liquidator and that the liquidator had not been served. He, however, undertook to accept service for the liquidator then and asked for an adjournment to file a Counter-Affidavit and to call witnesses to refute allegations contained in the Official Receiver's

The Court granted an adjournment of one week and stated that this 10 will allow service of the petition on the liquidator and the filing of a Counter-Affidavit by him if necessary and that it will also allow the calling of witnesses if he sees fit. The hearing of the petition was then adjourned to February 4, 1953.

On February 4, 1953, a Counter-Affidavit, filed by the liquidator, was before this Court; but no witnesses were produced by Mr. Thompson. In this connection the Court was informed in effect that application for witnesses subpoenas had only been made on 3.2.53 and that the registrar of this Court had only received the application on the morning of February 4, 1953.

I have, however, now got the liquidator's application for subpoenas before me and see that in fact it was submitted to the Registry on 2/2/53, but even so this shows delay and delay for which no explanation has been Before this Court heard submissions concerning the petition Mr. Thompson raised a preliminary objection regarding the procedure adopted by the Official Receiver in presenting his petition supported by an affidavit signed by him.

This procedure of presenting a petition supported by an affidavit signed by the petitioner follows both local and English practice but Mr. Thompson contended, in effect, that the petition should have been presented 30 in the form of a writ. His objection was overruled.

The Court then listened to argument both for and against the petition. Mr. Thompson in reply to the Official Receiver referred to the liquidator's affidavit and stated that the purpose of the voluntary liquidation was to enable the Company to evolve a scheme of reconstruction. Mr. Thompson then said that he wished to contest this case and asked for an adjournment and that creditors should be brought to Court.

Finally this Court announced that it would give its decision on whether evidence should be taken in this matter or whether the Official Receiver's petition should be granted forthwith on February 6, 1953 (today).

In the affidavit filed by the local liquidator Mr. John Adebayo there is no denial of certain important averments made by the Official Receiver in his petition.

These are:

1. That the directors of the Company are Mr. Adeboyo Shobayo Olumuyiwa Coker and Mr. Tijani Afolabi Adeosun;

- 2. that the issued capital of the Company is £25,194 made up of In the 500 preference shares and 24,694 ordinary shares.
- 3. that Mr. Coker holds the whole of the 500 issued preference shares and 24,455 of the 24,694 ordinary shares.

Supreme Court of Nigeria.

This last averment means in effect that the Nigerian Farmers Decision of & Commercial Bank Ltd., is virtually a one-man Company.

Court on Official Receiver. February 1953 -

Further it is not denied by the liquidator that he was the nominee of Petition of Mr. Coker for the position of liquidator. He denies that he was appointed by Mr. Coker; but I can see no denial in his affidavit of the statement 10 in paragraph 16 of the petition to the effect that he is the nominee of Mr. Coker who has complete control of the Company.

On these facts which are in themselves sufficient, in my opinion, to continued. justify a winding up by the Court I see no reason to call evidence; and that being so I do not think it necessary to allow evidence to be called in relation to other matters; and accordingly I order a refund of the fees paid for witness subpoenas by the local liquidator.

No fraud is alleged by the Official Receiver: but in my opinion it would be contrary to public interest and against the interest of creditors generally to allow a Company to continue a voluntary winding up under the 20 circumstances mentioned.

On the 12th of December, 1952, the Company passed an extra-ordinary resolution. In this it was resolved that the Nigerian Farmers & Commercial Bank Ltd. cannot by reason of its liabilities and other difficulties continue its business and that it is advisable to wind up the same and that the Company be wound up voluntarily. It was also resolved that Mr. John Adebayo be appointed liquidator.

If as stated by Counsel for the liquidator the purpose of the voluntary liquidation is to enable the Company to evolve a scheme of re-construction it seems extremely odd to me that the reason for winding up should be as 30 stated in the resolution.

If the Company has in fact a scheme of re-construction in view there is nothing in my opinion to stop this being considered by creditors after the Official Receiver takes over.

Having carefully considered the petition filed together with the affidavit of the local liquidator Mr. Adebayo and having heard the submissions of Counsel I am satisfied in accordance with S.132 (2) of the Companies Ordinance that the present voluntary winding up of the Nigerian Farmers & Commercial Bank Ltd., cannot be continued with due regard to the interests of creditors and I order:

- 1.—That the Nigerian Farmers & Commercial Bank Ltd. be wound up 40 by this Court.
 - 2.—That the Official Receiver of Nigeria be appointed liquidator of the said Company; and
 - 3.—That the local liquidator of the said Company Mr. John Adebayo hand over to the Official Receiver all books, papers and other documents in

This is an application for stay of execution pending the determination of an appeal to this Court. The appeal has been entered.

GREGG, J., heard a petition from the Official Receiver praying that an 20 order be made for the winding up by the Court of the Nigerian Farmers & Commercial Bank Limited. The said Bank was then in voluntary liquidation and the present applicant had been appointed as liquidator.

On the 6th February, 1953, GREGG, J., ordered that the Company be wound up by the Court and appointed the Official Receiver as liquidator. On the 13th February, 1953, notice of motion for stay of execution was filed.

Learned counsel for the present applicant have submitted that the appeal is not a frivolous one and that if the winding-up by the Official Receiver and Liquidator is allowed to proceed, all the assets may have been realised before the appeal is decided. This would mean, said counsel, that 30 even if the Appellant were successful, his success would not have any practical result.

In re 1897 Jubilee Sites Syndicate (1899) 2 Ch. 204 was cited to me in support of the submission that a compulsory winding-up order should not be made as a matter of course, and that a strong case should be made to show that it is required. Learned counsel for the applicant pointed out that no allegation of fraud had been made and that the voluntary liquidation should have been allowed to proceed.

I am not hearing the appeal and I must not be taken as expressing any opinion as to whether it should succeed or fail.

I have read Section 132 (2) of the Companies Ordinance which lays down that where a company is being wound up voluntarily, a petition may be presented by the Official Receiver but that the Court shall not make a winding up order on the petition unless it is satisfied that the voluntary African Court of Appeal.

In the West winding up cannot be continued with due regard to the interests of the creditors or contributories.

I have also read Gregg, J.'s decision, a copy of which is annexed to the applicant's affidavit. I note that the learned judge stated that it was not denied by the applicant that he was Mr. A. S. O. Coker's nominee and that the Company was practically a one-man company (because Mr. Coker holds all the issued preference shares and 24,455 out of 24,694 ordinary shares).

By reason of these facts the learned judge considered that it would be contrary to public interest and to the interest of the creditors to allow the voluntary winding up to continue.

I have therefore to consider whether I would be justified in granting a

stay, thus interfering with the interest of creditors.

In this connection I would mention a decision of Vaughan Williams, J., reported in (1894) 1 Ch. 444 (In re Medical Battery Company) in which the learned Judge stated that it would be very prejudicial to the interests of the creditors that any one should continue to act as liquidator who is under the control of the shareholders. In that case the position was very similar to that in the present case because the control of the Company was in the hands of the managing director and his immediate family and this resulted in their nominee becoming voluntary liquidator.

Although an order under Section 132 (2) should not be made as of course and should not be made unless a strong case has been made, it seems to me on the authority of In re Medical Battery Company that a situation which is prejudicial to the interests of creditors does justify the interference

of the Court.

I would therefore require some very special and convincing reason

for granting a stay of execution.

One of the reasons put forward by the applicant is that the creditors have a scheme of reconstruction whereby the Company can be resuscitated, but that those interested in financing the Company will not supply the 30 necessary funds if the Company is to be wound up by the Court.

I am not much impressed by this reason. First of all, I would point out that the Company went into voluntary liquidation because it could not continue its business by reason of its liabilities and other difficulties. It is not a case of a Company going into voluntary liquidation for the purpose of reconstruction. I would also point out that meetings of creditors and contributories have to be summoned (Section 147 of the Ordinance) and that the creditors and the contributories may express their wishes to the liquidator (Section 153 sub-section (2)).

I do not share the fear, voiced by learned Counsel for the applicant, 40 that if a stay is not granted now no practical advantage would result from a successful appeal. The winding-up has not really begun yet and I do not think that any reasonable wish expressed by a majority of creditors (that certain assets be not realised too rapidly) would be lightly disregarded by the liquidator.

For the foregoing reasons I refuse to grant the stay prayed for.

- 1.—That the Affidavit of the Applicants A. S. O. Coker and T. A. Adeoshun is not correct in several particulars, viz.:—
 - (a) That the District Officers were not instructed to take action on my behalf after the Supreme Court Order of the 16th March, 1953 as alleged in paragraph 6 of the Affidavit but were instructed by telegram (a copy of which is hereto annexed and marked "A") to act on the 7th day of March, 1953, as the time granted by the Supreme Court Order of the 6th day of February, 1953, for the 20 handing over by the applicants of the books and other documents of the Bank expired on the 6th day of March, 1953 and the Applicants failed to comply with the Order.
 - (b) That no books or documents were removed from the majority of the Branches as the Managers were stated to have left the various towns and to have proceeded to Lagos with the books and the keys. In these cases the only action taken by the District Officers was to seal the premises in order to preserve whatever assets might be left. That in four cases only did the District Officers obtain any books from the Managers, i.e., Abeokuta, 30 Ovo, Gusau and Ibadan and that in all these cases no current books were obtained but only old books already closed off. In the cases of Abeokuta and Oyo these books are in the possession of my representative and the applicant A. S. O. Coker is aware of this and has not attempted to collect them although invited to do so even though they would be of no help to him being out of date.

(c) That paragraph 11 of the said affidavit is untrue in that after the In the West Supreme Court Order of the 23rd day of March, 1953 and in African accordance therewith I instructed the District Officers to unseal the premises to allow the Managers to remove any books which were still there and their personal belongings. This is an appeal from a decision of Gregg, J. by which he ordered that the Nigerian Farmers and Commercial Bank Limited, who were in voluntary liquidation, be wound up by the Court and appointed the Official Receiver of Nigeria Liquidator.

The Appellant Bank went into voluntary liquidation on the 12th December, 1952, as a result of a resolution at an extraordinary general 10 meeting to the effect that it could not by reason of its liabilities and difficulties continue its business, and at the same meeting one Mr. John Adebayo was appointed Liquidator.

The Official Receiver then presented a petition asking that the Company be wound up by the Court and that he be appointed Liquidator.

Three grounds were argued at the hearing of this appeal, firstly, that while it would have been in order for a creditor to lodge a Petition such as the one lodged here, the Official Receiver had no locus standi to do so at the present juncture, secondly, that the grounds put forward by the Official Receiver were insufficient to justify the Court in making an order 20 for the winding up of the Company by the Court, and, thirdly, that the Court below had no jurisdiction to appoint the Official Receiver as Liquidator because by paragraph (b) of Section 144 (3) of the Companies Ordinance, Chapter 38, on an order for winding up a company being made by the Court the Official Receiver becomes ipso facto the provisional liquidator and that no liquidator can be appointed until a meeting of creditors has been summoned under Section 147 of the Ordinance.

The first ground is disposed of by the provisions of Sub-section (2) of Section 132 of the Companies Ordinance which clearly empowers the Official Receiver to present a petition when a company is in voluntary 30 liquidation. It is then for the Court to say whether the voluntary winding up "cannot be continued with due regard to the interests of the creditors "or contributories."

When announcing his decision to order that the Company be wound up by the Court the learned trial Judge made the following observations:

"In the affidavit filed by the local liquidator Mr. John "Adebayo there is no denial of certain important averments "made by the Official Receiver in his petition.

"THESE ARE:

"1. that the directors of the Company are Mr. Adeboye "Shobayo Olumuyiwa Coker and Mr. Tijani Afolabi Adeosun; "2. that the issued capital of the Company is £25,194 made "up of 500 preference shares and 24,694 ordinary shares.

No. 46. Judgment. 18th May 1953 continued. "3. that Mr. Coker holds the whole of the 500 issued preference shares and 24,455 of the 24,694 ordinary shares.

"This last averment means in effect that the Nigerian "Farmers & Commercial Bank Ltd. is virtually a one-man "Company.

"Further it is not denied by the liquidator that he was the "nominee of Mr. Coker for the position of liquidator. He denies "that he was appointed by Mr. Coker; but I can see no denial "in his affidavit, of the statement in para. 16 of the petition to "the effect that he is the nominee of Mr. Coker who has complete 10 "control of the Company."

It is a well settled principle that the Court of Appeal will not interfere with an exercise of discretion, as this was, by a lower Court unless it has proceeded upon a manifestly wrong ground. In my view the grounds stated by the learned trial Judge were sufficient to entitle him to exercise his discretion in favour of making a compulsory order, and I am, therefore, unable to agree with the Appellant's second submission. In this connection it is of interest to observe that a compulsory order was made by Vaughan Williams, J. in the case of *In re Medical Battery Company* (1894) 1 Ch. 444, on similar grounds.

Counsel for the Official Receiver conceded the third point taken by the Appellants and although, at first, I had some doubts about the matter I have now come to the conclusion that the better view is that contended for by Appellants Counsel. I, therefore, agree that once a compulsory winding up Order has been made the Official Receiver automatically becomes provisional liquidator until such time as a permanent liquidator is appointed and, that the latter cannot be appointed until the creditors and contributories have been consulted in accordance with the procedure laid down by Section 147 (1) of the Companies Ordinance. A similar view of the matter was taken by the Court in the case of *In re John Reid and Sons*, *Limited* (1900), 2 Q.B.D. 634.

For the reasons I have given I would delete that portion of the Order of the Court below which appoints the Official Receiver Liquidator of the Bank, but would dismiss the appeal upon the other grounds raised, and in the circumstances I would make no order as to costs on this appeal.
